The residents of Belvedere Avenue and surrounding districts were saddened by the sudden and unexpected passing of the Prince Edward Island Hospital on Sept. 7, 1955 of Elmer J. Campbell in his 53rd year.

Mr. Campbell a well-known citizen resided at Belvedere Avenue for the past seven years. He was sales manager on S. R. Johnston Ltd. Previously he was employed as Maritime salesman for the International Harvester Company.

Although in ill health for some time, before undergoing an operation which all hoped would be successful, his heart was with all his loved ones. It was not strong enough to bring him through so his spirit took flight to him who gave it.

Mr. Campbell who uttered no complaint, took great pleasure in entertaining and giving advice to all the young folks who so often enjoyed visiting his home.

Before moving to Charlottetown Mr. Campbell's home was Rollo Bay, P. E. I., where everyone so often went to enjoy his company.

He was a member of Trinity United Church and the A. F. & M. M.

The largely attended funeral and many floral tributes showed Mr. Campbell's popularity. A short service at his home was conducted by the Rev. A. Frank MacLean and Rev. Howard Christie. There his many friends followed him to Bay Fortune United Church where Rev. A. Frank MacLean, assisted by Rev. D. Sharpe conducted the service during which Mr. Leigh Dingwall sang a solo, "City Four Square."

Hymns sung were "Count Your Blessings," "Abide With Me," "Safe In The Arms of Jesus". The Masonic Service at the grave was conducted by R. F. Kemp. Interment was in the church cemetery.

Six of his fellow workers acted as pallbearers: Messrs. Roulston Johnston, Jack Warren, Harold Simpson, Reginald Reid, Colin Mackay and William Virtue.

Coffin Says Innocent Of Murder But Admits Theft

QUEBEC (CP) — Wilbert Coffin, convicted of the 1953 murder of one of three American bear hunters found dead in the Gaspé peninsula, says he is innocent of the slaying but admits stealing certain of the hunters' belongings.

A 6,000-word statement on the case was obtained from the 44-year-old prospector last Saturday by one of his lawyers who visited the death cell at Montreal's Bordeaux Jail. Contents of the statement were outlined Tuesday by the lawyer-Francois Gravel of Quebec.

Coffin is scheduled to be hanged Oct. 21.

Mr. Gravel described the statement as a rebuttal of the main incriminatory points brought up at Coffin's trial last summer in Percé. Coffin did not testify at the trial.

THREE DIED
He was sentenced to be hanged for the murder of Richard Lindsey, 17, whose body was found in Gaspé bushland in 1953, near those of his father Eugene, 47, and a friend, Albert Claar, 20. All were from Hollidaysburg, Pa.

Mr. Gravel quoted Coffin as saying in the statement: "I am innocent of the said crime and I am not in any way guilty of the said murder... moreover, I feel that I was not given a fair trial."

The Quebec lawyer said Coffin's statement, as well as what was described as "new evidence," now in the hands of the federal justice department in Ottawa for consideration.

A full bench of the Supreme Court of Canada last week turned down Coffin's request for leave to appeal the conviction, and only the ordering of a new trial by the justice department or a commutation of sentence by the federal cabinet can save him from the gallows.

READ STATEMENT
At a press conference in his office Mr. Gravel read parts of Coffin's statement to newspaper men. He quoted Coffin as saying that he first met the Lindsey party June 10 some 50 miles west of Gaspé. Their truck was stalled on a bush road and he drove young Lindsey to Gaspé to buy a new fuel pump.

For this help, Coffin said he was given a Japanese hunting knife as well as \$40 in United States currency by the youthful hunter.

The prospector said he left the Lindsey's the same day, and when he passed on the same road June 12 he found their truck in the same spot as he had left it, but could not find any trace of the party.

Coffin said he then began drinking beer by the truck and shortly afterwards started a suit case from the vehicle. It contained a pair of binoculars two towels and a pair of pants.

These articles were identified at the trial as belonging to the Lindsey's but Gravel said no evidence was advanced on how they came into Coffin's possession.
