Hosp. Union Submits Brief As Wage Settlement Step

A request that the provincial government direct the Hospital Services Commission to provide funds to cover pay increases contained in working agreements negotiated by three Charlottetown hospitals and union locals at the institutions was made yesterday by the Canadian Union of Public Employees.

The request was contained in a brief presented to the cabinet of the national union on behalf of members of locals 805 and 826 of the union at Charlottetown Hospital and the P.E.I. Hospital.

Following yesterday's meeting, Welfare and Labor Minister Henry Wedge said there was little discussion on the brief. "It was pointed out that the union representatives," said Mr. Wedge, "that the government is now awaiting consideration by the treasury board of a new salary scale, resulting from the Payne Ross Limited job evaluation study there was no discussion on the brief."

"The board recommended that the government, presumably through the hospital commission immediately assure" the hospitals that sufficient funds be made available so that the award of the conciliation board would be implemented.

For almost three years, the local workers at the hospitals have been seeking pay increases for their members. Both hospitals have been willing to sign new agreements but have said they could not provide pay increases as their budgets are set by the Hospital Services Commission, which gets its funds from the provincial government.

The frustration and despair to which the union has been brought by the government policy resulted in the unions asking the government to conduct a strike vote in the bargaining unit.

HISTORY OF EFFORTS
Much of the 19-page brief deals with the history of the union's attempt to arrive at a satisfactory conclusion to its efforts to get wage increases for its members.

"The locals," it was stated, "entered into negotiations in 1961 in both hospitals, and for a time could not get anywhere because both hospital boards refused to deal with cost items on the ground that the Hospi-
