

GENERAL TELEGRAPHIC NEWS.

New York, Sept. 30.—As a result of a consultation between the larger coal producers an advance was made to-day in the price of anthracite coal. There was no general agreement, but prices were put up from 15 to 25 cents per ton.

St. Johns, N.B., Sept. 30.—The attacks upon the Wesleyan conference, and it is believed that the whole government is on the eve of disruption. Today the counsel which is defending the directors of the defunct Union Bank began proceedings against the Telegram, the proprietor of the newspaper, before the supreme court, complaining that its articles upon the bank inquiry, which is now sub-judice, are calculated to prevent their clients from securing a fair trial. The matter comes up for hearing on Friday or Saturday.

London, Sept. 30.—A despatch from Pekin to Reuters' agency confirms the news given out by the British foreign office to-day, and exclusively cabled to the Associated Press, that a decree has already been published in the Pekin Official Gazette, ordering that Liu, viceroy of Szechuan, be stripped of his rank for failing to protect the missionaries in his district, and that he be not permitted to again hold office. The Pekin despatches add that the French minister to China yesterday demanded reparation for the outrages on French subjects.

London, Sept. 30.—The women scored another victory against the Methodists to-day. The Rock River conference, by a vote of 142 to 27, decided in favor of the admission of women as delegates to the general conference. Every prominent minister in the conference voted for the women.

New York, September, 30.—A special to the Herald from Kingston, Jamaica, says:—The captain of the steamship Alene, of the Atlas line, reported yesterday that his ship was fired upon by a Spanish gunboat on Thursday morning at exactly 7 o'clock. The Alene was bound from New York to Kingston, and was off Cape May when the gunboat appeared in her wake and without warning threw three shots after her. The Alene at once hoisted her colors, and turned about in her course. The Spanish warship fired in return until she was within a mile of the Alene, when she reversed her course, put on full steam and, as if desiring to give an explanation, sailed swiftly away. Many American on board the British steamer were extremely indignant over the matter.

London, Sept. 30.—The visit of the king of the Belgians to France, which at first was supposed by the Paris newspapers to be merely one of pleasure, is now known to relate to the Congo state and out to France. They seem to be ignorant of the fact that he was in London before going to Paris, and was negotiating here on the same subject. It is the general opinion that Leopold is trying to arrange for the sale of the Congo state on the basis of a division of territory between France and Germany and England. It is a complicated affair. Belgium in 1890 granted to the Congo state a loan of £1,000,000, without interest, with power to annex the state at the expiration of ten years. Then, France, if the state is ever offered for sale, has the right of pre-emption. King Leopold is much harassed both in a monetary and in a political way. He wants the affairs of the Congo state wound up summarily. He does not seem to care whether he stirs up feuds between France and England and Germany. He only wants to get out.

Bathurst, Sept. 30.—Negotiations have been in progress during the week for a settlement of the school trouble. The terms of agreement have been decided upon and are expected to be concluded this week. The Roman Catholics held a meeting in the priest's house last night to consider the terms offered them and they have accepted. The Protestant ratepayers held a meeting tonight and agreed to them also, and forwarded the same to counsel for both parties. The terms are thought by both parties to be very fair.

—There is a good deal of activity among the North British Atlantic squadron in the harbor of Halifax, and it is believed to have some connection with the Mosquito coast difficulty. The Rambler and Magician have received orders to sail and leave for the West Indies on Wednesday.

—Montreal Gazette: "When, five years ago, Sir John Macdonald dissolved Parliament a year before the expiry of its term, Mr. Laurier denounced the act as unconstitutional and a crime. Now Mr. Blair has followed the example, and Mr. Laurier will also be silent. Mr. Laurier is a strict constitutionalist only when some party advantage to the Liberals is to be obtained."

—In Victoria, B. C., a few days ago Professor Robertson recommended the growing of clover and horse beans for cheap nutrition feed for cattle, and also to enrich the land. In the keeping of cows, he said the farmers can make money only by keeping the cows giving milk for a long period every year—at least ten and a half months. The cow cannot create and does not destroy, she merely changes feed into a more valuable form. If she is a poor cow she consumes without making the profitable change—such as hay or corn stalks, into cream.

NEWS NOTES.

There is a water famine in Hazelton, B.C., where more than ten thousand men are idle, owing to the shutting down of various industries. Notwithstanding the financial failure, so far, of the Manchester and Baltic canals, it has been decided to build a ship canal from Hays to the seaboard.

It is generally understood in English political circles that it is the intention of the Unionist party to introduce measures for the reform of the House of Lords. Dean Farrar, in an address last week, deplored that the appeals and work of the temperance party have as yet barely touched the fringe of the conscience of the English people.

The relations between Emperor William and Prince von Hohenlohe are so strained that it would not be surprising if there should be a new Chancellor before the expiration of the year. It is stated in Washington that the United States has intimated to the Spanish Minister that unless Spain restores order within a certain time in Cuba there will be international interference on behalf of the Cubans.

According to the London Times, the Irish land question will be settled next year, and this will be followed in 1897 by an Irish Local Government measure, which will probably include the creation of a central council in Dublin. A meeting of the Conservatives of South Ontario was held at Windsor on Saturday last, when it was resolved that a practical farmer should hold the portfolio of Minister of Agriculture for the Dominion, and Mr. W. Smith, who represents the riding, was made their choice.

The London Times publishes a despatch from Berlin, which says that the Chinese government has informed Germany that the leaders of the attack upon the German mission at Swatun have been arrested and measures will be taken to arrest others concerned. Mr. Ha'el Caine is to be entertained by the publishers of New York and Boston, and probably by those of Toronto. The sealing fleet has returned, but with little success. The catch is the smallest taken in many years. The overseers of the fishery, that is the British and United States' papers say that next year their occupation will be gone.
