ing whether spades or hearts would be the best trump suit, he pushed the choice back to South. West decided to open the diamond ace and declarer played dummy's king on it. West then shifted to the ace of clubs and continued with a club, won by the king.

The contract could not now be beaten, although superficially there were still two heart losers. A simple elimination play enabled South to escape one of the heart losers.

After drawing two rounds of trumps, declarer ruffed his last club in dummy. He then cashed the Q-10 of diamonds, discarding a heart from dummy. Next he played a heart and took West's ten with the ace.

By now dummy had two trumps and the J-4 of hearts. The eight of hearts was led and West had to win with the king. West was forced to return a diamond or a club, and declarer was able to ruff in one hand while discarding a heart from the other.

It would not have helped West any if he had played the king of hearts instead of the ten when the suit was first led. Again South wins with the ace. He re-enters his hand with a trump and leads a heart towards the J-4.

When West produces the ten, declarer ducks in dummy. If East overtakes the ten, dummy's jack becomes a trick, while if East plays low, West is in the lead and must give declarer the fatal ruff and discard.

Newly Weds' Problem Is Stressed By Labor

LONDON (GP)—A Labor party fact-finding group urged Saturday special purpose loans and a marriage savings program to help newlyweds cope with the problem of creating a home.

The party's youth commission called for these and other measures, including more sex education in schools, to overcome the hurdles created by the post-war trend to earlier marriages.

The commission, in a booklet entitled *The Younger Generation*, warned that a crisis for Britain's youth is near and urged sweeping and rapid reforms to deal with the post-war "youth bulge."

The study called for immediate steps to provide more jobs for young people, the expansion of education and recreational facilities, raising of the school-leaving age and a demonstration of greater interest in the new generation by adults.
