Industrial Act Is Proclaimed

Premier W. R. Shaw announced yesterday the cabinet has proclaimed the Industrial Enterprises Act.

The act passed at the last session of the Legislature, will set up a new organization to promote industrial development in the province.

The corporation will take over from the government's P.E.I. Industrial Establishment Corporation the promotion of industry.

In announcing the proclamation, the premier said "the government feels an independent board will be more able than the government to accurately assess the values of any industrial expansion that might be promoted by private industry. This has been the experience of other provinces, particularly Nova Scotia."

The new organization should remove the government from political attack on its development policies. These attacks have been too common in the past but now industrial development will be brought into the hands of men of good business judgement and experience. The first appointees to the corporation's board of directors represent both political parties in the province and for that reason should be free of political criticism."

MAIN REASON

The premier said one of the main reasons for the setting up of the new corporation is that it will provide for a thoroughly experienced and independent examination of all representations for the location of new industry.

Premier Shaw said "the government wishes to do everything possible to promote expansion and we feel that this new set-up will be of great advantage in that promotion."

The act provides for a 10-man board of directors for the corporation. Already named as directors are Carl F. Burke, John Simmonds, William A. Rix and Austin A. Scales, all of Charlottetown, and William A. Arnett, Summerside.

According to the act, the already named directors have power to appoint other directors—but the number of directors must not exceed 10.

The act also provides that the first general meeting of the company must be held within six months of proclamation of the act.

No Inquest Planned In Vernon River Death

Fire at Vernon River yesterday claimed the life of eight-year-old Roy Weatherbie. No inquest will be held.

The boy's body was found by firemen shortly before 10 a.m. in the still-burning ruins of a barn behind his home, confirming the fears of a crowd of neighbors who watched and parents who waited in the nearby home of friends.

The fire began at 7:15 when persons passing the home on the main highway noticed the fire and turned in the alarm. Roy was missing at the time.

"He went out in the barn to see the cat and kittens. That's the last they saw of him," a fireman said.

While three fire departments — Vernon River, Parkdale and Eldon — fought the fire, search parties scoured a thick wooded area behind the home and hunted in the neighborhood for the boy.

A neighbor said he had a tendency to run and hide in the woods whenever something went wrong.

Cause of the fire, which leveled the barn in spite of a sometimes heavy rain falling, was not known. The small barn contained a large amount of straw.

The fire did not spread to the farmhouse, less than 30 feet away. There are no other buildings at the farm, located four tenths of a mile west of the Roman Catholic Church.

Roy was the son of Mr. and Mrs. John Weatherbie. Mr. Weatherbie is an employee of Douglas Brothers and Jones Ltd., Charlottetown.

Besides his parents, he is survived by two brothers, Emmett and David, and a sister, Mary Lou.

John Joseph Gaudet, Winsloe, was fined \$10 and costs for a stop sign violation.

John Reginald MacDonald, Charlottetown, was fined \$10 and costs for permitting an unlicensed driver to operate a motor vehicle.

Jean Eleanor Johnston, City, and Gaylene MacDonald, City, were each fined \$10 and costs for operating motor vehicles while not possessing driver's licenses.

Victor Pineau, Rustico, was fined \$10 and costs for illegal parking.

Premier Feels Grant Is Small

Premier Walter Shaw said yesterday Ottawa "doesn't appear to be hurrying itself in any way" by its grant of \$150,000 towards operation and maintenance costs of Confederation Centre.

He said "this province has been pretty generous in voting about \$20,000 this year toward the building, but with Ottawa's \$150,000 there is still a financial gap that has to be filled."

Premier Shaw said "as far as I am concerned, I don't feel that this province is going to fill it."

It has been estimated that operating and maintenance costs of the building will run around \$300,000 annually.
