'Confederation' Makes Trial Run Across Strait On Friday

The new CNR ferry "Confederation" made a familiarization run across the Northumberland Strait from Borden, P.E.I. to Cape Tormentine, N.B. yesterday after being laid up in Borden for more than a week with a damaged rudder.

The ferry's steering gear was damaged several weeks ago in the Strait during a trial run across the nine-mile stretch of water. The accident occurred a day after she arrived in Borden from Halifax where she was built.

A spokesman for the CNR in Moncton said last night the Confederation would conduct load-carrying familiarization trips during the next few days before being put into regular service.

The ferry service is being carried out at present by the ferries Prince Edward Island and Scotia II. The MV Abegweit is in Halifax for her annual refit.

Meanwhile, at the other end of the Strait, the ferry Lord Selkirk made the first crossing of the season yesterday between Wood Islands, P.E.I. and Carleton Place, N.S.

This service was originally expected to begin earlier this week but ice conditions were not favorable.

Information gathered will be made available so that sealers will have a well-rounded picture of operations, including possible advantages of using helicopters as opposed to stiff-winged planes in hunting, and an analysis of costs and profits of the business.

A fisheries official said yesterday that his department will suggest that some sort of survival equipment be carried by sealers when they hunt off shore. He pointed out that many hundreds carry no more than a knife and "the clothes on their back" when hunting and could get into difficulties if a sudden storm arose.

The official said that representatives of a Montreal helicopter firm have offered to sit in on the meeting to pass on experience gained by hunting with helicopters during this year's season.

Lobster Catches Reported 'Good'

Lobster fishermen at North Lake were reported last night to have had the best day thus far this year as far as catches were concerned yesterday. No actual figures were available but it was estimated that catches averaged in the vicinity of 600 pounds per fisherman.

Catches at Souris and Nantux were down from the previous day. Prices early in the morning at Souris were 30 cents per pound for canners with the marketing price being 35 cents per pound. However, late in the day prices jumped to 33 cents per pound for canners and 30 cents per pound for marketers.

Fishermen in the Southern King's area state that the situation remains the same as the previous day.

Conditions in the north shore area also remained unchanged as ice continued to jam coastal waters.

Joseph Gaudin, Rustico, said last night that the ice seemed to loosen up during the day and that it was hard to tell when the fishermen could get out.

"The ice could go out overnight and it could be here for a month," he said.

Acknowledging that he had been "in jail quite a bit", Arsenault said he was really up and had been happy to get out of jail. He said he felt that because of his reputation for drinking it was difficult for him to get a job locally, and asked the court to let him go to Moncton to seek employment and rehabilitation there.

Chief of Police Peter R. White said that in view of past experiments of this nature he didn't see any hope for him on this proposal.

Magistrate Hinton said, "there would be if we had a prison farm."

The Magistrate said, "They treat you pretty good up here?" and Arsenault said "Yes, too good, there's no work to do."

In declining Arsenault's request for freedom to go to Moncton, Magistrate Hinton considered the likelihood of his being picked up for vagrancy or intoxication and said, "If you can't keep out, you may as well stay in your own jail", and Arsenault went back to Prince County Jail for another 30 days.
