Through the co-operation of the officer commanding the "L" Division RCMP the range facilities at the headquarters have been made available to the club twice a week.

Range officers for the season will be Bob Barwise and Len MacDonald. During the meeting it was also decided that more encouragement should be given to boys and girls under the age of 15 who are interested in the shooting game but have no opportunity to practice or to receive instruction. Summerside's Coke Grady was in the third spot, with three goals and four assists good for seven points.

Three players were tied for fourth. They were Merrill Pincau, Penguins, three goals and three assists (Pincau played in only one game), Benny Grady (Aces), four goals and two assists and Ullric Gallant with two goals and four assists.

Two players had five points. Roy 'Buck' Whitlock of the Royals scored one and set up four others. Aces' Vance Harris had a similar showing.

Ralph 'Farmer' Josey was the league's leading bad man to date with 14 minutes served with the timers. However, 'Farmer' was being pushed for the penalty lead by Aces' Grant Grady and Penguins' Doug Williams. Each of these defencemen were a mere two minutes behind Josey.

Penguins had spent a total of 42 minutes with the timers in three games. Aces in the same number of games had a penalty total of 31 minutes. Royals with one game less played had the same number of minutes as the Aces. Saints in two games collected a total of 23 minutes.

Goalies Thane Doyle and Thane Mann had the best average among the netminders. Eich had played three games and allowed 15 goals for a 5 goals-per game average.
