Austrian Student To Study P.E.I. Red Cross Operation

Ferry Gibler of Vienna, Austria, who was an adult leader at the Junior Red Cross International Study Centre held at the University of Toronto during August, will visit the Prince Edward Island Red Cross from Sept. 19th to 23rd.

This announcement was made at the regular monthly meeting of the P.E.I. Red Cross executive chaired by the vice-president, J. Gordon MacDonald, in the absence of the president, Judge J.S. DesRoches.

Mr. Gibler is a university student in Vienna who will be joining the staff of the Austrian Red Cross upon graduation. Before returning to Austria at the end of September, he is being given an opportunity to see the Canadian Red Cross in action in the eastern provinces, and plans are being made to have him meet with the various chairmen and directors of Red Cross programs while he is here.

The outstanding success of the International Junior Red Cross Study Centre was commended upon by K.A. Parker, chairman of the Junior Red Cross committee, in giving his report. He said he had heard glowing reports of this Centre from Muriel St. John of Charlottetown, Irwin Howatt of Kensington and Mrs. Paul Devlin, director of the P.E.I. Junior Red Cross, who had been this province's representatives among the 300 delegates from 50 countries.

An encouraging report on the progress of the 1959 financial campaign revealed that to date \$25,025.77 has been received. This represents 88 per cent of the objective of \$28,500, and there are still some canvassers to make returns.

Mrs. B.C. Vanderstine, vice-chairman of the women's work committee, told the meeting that 12 large cases filled with 4,000 garments for children under eight years of age had been shipped to India on August 17th in response to an appeal from the League of Red Cross Societies for the relief of flood victims in India and Pakistan.

Mrs. Vanderstine also read a letter from the national chairman of Red Cross women's work committees, appealing for clothing for infants and girls and boys in Liberia where there is a great deal of poverty. This request came from the president of the Liberian Red Cross who was among the adult leaders who attended the Junior Red Cross International Study Centre

in Toronto.

REFUGEE YEAR

An outline was given of a plan to highlight "World Refugee Year" - June 15th 1959 - July 15th, 1960. The Canadian Red Cross Society is one of the 27 organizations composing the Canadian Committee for World Refugee Year and carries on an extensive program for refugees from year to year through its international relief, women's work and Junior Red Cross.

To further commemorate the 50th Anniversary of the Canadian Red Cross Society, which is being celebrated this year, an "Open House" will be held at Red Cross headquarters in Charlottetown in late October when the general public will be invited to view displays of the work carried out by the different Committees.

Mrs. Bouchard Passes At 90

GEORGETOWN - The death occurred at her home in Georgetown on Friday, September 4th, of Mrs. Sarah Ann Bouchard in her 91st year. The late Mrs. Bouchard had been able to attend to her household duties within several days of her passing.

She was the former Sarah Ann MacDonald of St. Peter's and had resided in Georgetown since 1909. Her husband, the late Joseph Bouchard, predeceased her in 1950.

She leaves to mourn her passing one daughter, Elizabeth, (Mrs. Gerald Moriarty of Halifax, N.S.), and four sons, Edward at home in Georgetown; Alex of Annapolis; Frank and Augustus both of Charlottetown. She is also survived by nine grandchildren and five great-grandchildren.

The funeral was held on Monday, September 7th, from St. James Roman Catholic Church, Georgetown with Rev. O. Kiggins celebrating Requiem Mass. The pallbearers were: Albert King, D. A. MacCormack; William S. Martell; James MacIsaac; Bernard Keenan and Neil A. Wight.

Interment was in St. James Church Cemetery, Georgetown. A.C.

Brehaut Bursary Founded At Dal For P.E.I. Students

An announcement of the establishment of the Ernest Brehaut Memorial Bursary in Dalhousie University has just been made by President A.E. Kerr. The Bursary has been endowed by Mrs. Brehaut, who now resides in Colorado Springs.

The late Dr. Brehaut was born in Murray Harbour, P.E.I., and came from a family that has made fine contribution to the learned professions. He graduated as B.A. from Dalhousie in 1894. During his course he won the North British Society Prize in 1892, and the Senior Munro Exhibition Prize in 1893. After his graduation from Dalhousie he went to Harvard, where he obtained his B.A. and M.A. Then because of a breakdown in health he went to Colorado, where he taught Latin for some years in Colorado College.

When he recovered his health he resumed his studies, and obtained the degree of Ph.D. from Columbia University in 1912. His doctoral dissertation, "An encyclopedist of the Dark Ages: Isidore of Seville," was published by the Columbia University Press. After many years of service as an honoured professor at Colorado College, he died in 1954.

P.E.I. STUDENT
The bursary which will be awarded annually by Dalhousie, will cover the present tuition fees in the normal first year of the Arts and Science course. It will be restricted to qualified students from Prince Edward Island, preference being given to relatives of the late Professor Brehaut. While the academic record of the applicant is important, character, financial need, and the report of the school or college principal will also be considered in making the selection. Students interested in obtaining the bursary for the 1959-1960 session should write to the Registrar, Dalhousie University.

Mrs. Brehaut, in endowing the Bursary, said that a fund to provide financial aid for students was the kind of memorial that would have pleased her husband best. Further, she said, "I will keep his name in close connection with Prince Edward Island, his home." Her intention, as she expressed it in a letter, is that the bursary should benefit a "boy from Prince Edward Island who needs the help in order to get an education, and is the kind who could make good use of it."

In making the announcement, Dr. Kerr remarked, "In a long succession, many able young men from Prince Edward Island have come to Dalhousie for their university education, and subsequently have achieved positions of eminence and usefulness in many parts of Canada and the United States. Professor Brehaut was one of this company, and we are most grateful to Mrs.

Brehaut for perpetuating his name in the University, in a manner that will help deserving students from his native province to continue their education and maintain the excellent tradition." The initial award will be made for one year only; but if the successful candidate achieves satisfactory academic standing he will be considered, year by year, for a renewal of the bursary. Therefore it is quite possible that the winner may receive assistance throughout his entire course.

In any year in which the bursary is not awarded, the income from the endowment will be used to provide the "Ernest Brehaut Memorial Lectures" to be given by an outstanding scholar on the invitation of the university.
