

St. Dunstan's High, Rangers Tangle Tonight

Action resumes in the Charlottetown and District Junior Hockey League tonight when the Rangers take to the ice for the second game of the best of five series with St. Dunstan's High School.

The Saints drew first blood in the series as they hammered the Norman 'Hawk' Larter coached Rangers 7-3 in the opening tilt of the final which was staged at the Charlottetown Forum last Sunday afternoon.

The Rangers captured the league championship and they were trampling their opposition, until it was announced that St. Dunstan's High School would replace the Saints' Junior Varsity team in the four team City loop.

The High School squad entered the league in January and they are undefeated this season. The Red and White team downed the high flying Rangers during the regular league schedule and convinced Mr. Larter's forces that it was no fluke as they blasted the Rogers outfit in the opening game of the finals in their quest for the championship.

Terry Braunstein Wins First Game

PERTH, Scotland (CP)—Canada's Terry Braunstein won his first game in the seventh international curling championships Monday night but had a tougher time than expected in defeating Dr. Borge Holmeron of Sweden 6-4.

In other first-round games in the five-game round-robin tournament, Scotland's Chuck Hay finished strongly to defeat the nervous United States rink skipped by Bud Summerville 11-5 and Switzerland defeated Norway 11-4.

Braunstein's Winnipeg rink, the 'Canadian champions' put together a pair of twos in the fourth and fifth ends to take control over the stubborn Swedes.

"We didn't take any chances," said Braunstein, 40. "We played it safe all the way. We were surprised the Swedes could hit as well as they did, but when they had the chance they didn't switch to a draw game when they had guards out front."

Dr. Holmeron admitted his team switched its usual pattern of play from a draw game to a hitting game.

"But we figured we had to if we were playing the Canadians. I think we could curl better but we were happy with our showing."

Summerville's Wisconsin rink was expected to put up a tighter battle against defending Scottish champion Chuck Hay and showed early promise by scoring singles in the first two ends. However, Hay scored three in the third end, aided by some erratic shooting by the Americans, went on to victory.

The big clash now is the Wednesday night meeting between Canada and Scotland and both rinks are expected to go undefeated until that time. The top four teams meet in a knockout competition Thursday.

Varsity Team Arrives Home

The St. Dunstan's Varsity hockey team arrived in Charlottetown yesterday after having advanced to the Canadian College finals in the Canadian College championship hockey tournament which was staged in Winnipeg, Friday and Saturday.

The John Kane coached Varsity squad advanced 16-0 the Dominion tournament by showing a clean pair of heels to the opposition in the Maritime Intercollegiate Hockey League as they racked up a ten and one record in the Maritime circuit. This was the first Maritime hockey championship for the Malpeque road institute of knowledge in 18 years.

The Kanemen came up against Sir George William University in their first game at Winnipeg and the Red and White squad toppled the Montreal University 3-1 and obtained the right to meet the University of Manitoba which had defeated Laurentian University earlier in the day.

The Saints were outclassed in the final against a powerful University of Manitoba representative. The Saints were down 6-0 when the siren went to end the first stanza. The Kanemen managed to battle the Manitoba pucksters on almost even terms for the first two periods of the championship battle, but the outcome of the game was never in doubt.

The defeat at the hands of the Manitoba team closed the '65 season for the John Kane coached aggregation and although their heads are bloodied we feel they have every right to carry them high and proud. Their performance in the Maritime circuit was par-excellence and when they took to the ice against Manitoba in the finals at Winnipeg it marked the first time that a Maritime college representative even advanced to the Dominion college hockey finals.

Their win over Sir George Williams comes against a college that has an enrollment approximately 15 times greater than St. Dunstan's. Paul Arsenault, a former SDU student and athlete, was handling the coaching chores for the Montreal college.

We would like to take this opportunity to offer our sincere congratulations to John Kane, coach of the Saints, and each and every member to the Maritime championship team for their fine performance.

Tid Bits From Here And There
Russia kept the world hockey title with a perfect record as they downed Canada 4-1, Sunday in the final game of the 1965 world hockey championships. It was the first time a Canadian team had ever lost three games in 45 years of world and Olympic competition. Russia won all seven starts in the 11-day tournament and finished with a total of 14 points. We think it was a sorry showing on the part of the Canadian team and we hope the situation will improve.

Congratulations to the Acadia University Axemen upon defeating the University of Windsor Lancers in the Canadian college basketball finals in Halifax, Saturday night. The Axemen with Stu Aberdeen at the helm were forced into overtime with the Lancers to obtain their championship. The Axemen weren't picked as winners when the Maritime college circuit got underway so that was a pretty good showing on the part of the Wolfville hoopers.

A noted leader in the field of agronomy, Professor Joseph Troil, of the University of Massachusetts, Amherst, Mass., will headline a field of golf turf experts who will participate in the seventh Atlantic Provinces Sports Turfgrass Conference to be held April 1-3 at the Nova Scotia Agriculture College, Truro. Professor Troil will discuss "Turf Problems" during the afternoon session of the first day and the second day he will discuss "Putting Green Grasses and Their Management."

The Chicago Black Hawks kept their first place hopes alive Sunday night when they downed the slumping Toronto Maple Leafs 4-2 in the fourth win for the Hawks in 14 games with the defending Stanley Cup champion Toronto club. Not a very impressive record for the Hawks. The Red Wings managed to stay two points ahead of the Billy Reay coached aggregation as the Abelmen dumped the last-place Boston Bruins 3-2.

Several horsemen from the Charlottetown Driving Park have passed along the word that Bud Campbell has been dragging the local track every evening in order to have it smooth for morning jog sessions. This is something that Bud does on his own and the horsemen have informed us that they would like Campbell to know that they certainly appreciate his efforts.

New York Rangers decided Monday to send centre Phil Goyette to Nassau for two weeks to recover from a chest ailment that has kept him out of the National Hockey League action since Feb. 24. Goyette, the club's leading scorer with 40 points in 52 games, is suffering an attack of tracheal bronchitis. He already has missed nine games.
