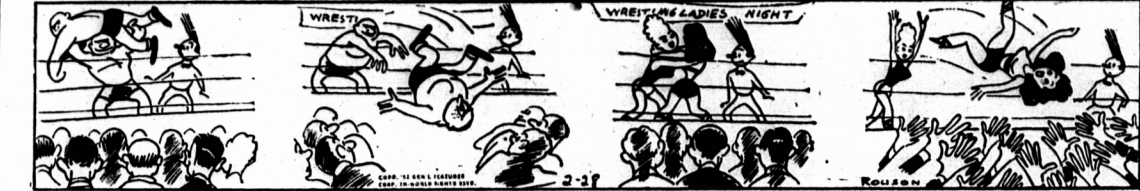

IN THIS CORNER

The Saint John Beavers by virtue of their 7-3 win last night struck the 100 point mark in the M. M. H. L. The Beavers with 101 points are 24 points ahead of their nearest competitors and for all practical purposes have clinched first place.

The Islanders with 14 games left have to win 12 in order to pass the 100 mark and the same stands for Halifax. The Saints last night became the second team in the M. M. H. L. to pass the 300 mark in scoring goals.

The winner of the N. B. P. E. I. Intercollegiate basketball title will be decided here tomorrow night when the University of New Brunswick five meet the St. Dunstan's University team. Mount Allison University and St. Thomas have been eliminated from the title hunt leaving only the Saints and U. N. B. Both teams have lost two games but the U. N. B. team has two more games to play and the Saints one. The Fredericton students play tonight at Mount A and regardless of whether they win or not the Saints will have to beat them here tomorrow night in order to obtain the two province crown.

Many of those who saw the Saints play Mount Allison University here several weeks ago predicted that the Saints would have little chance against the Sackville team on the latter's court. That was the game in which the Saints, led by Jack "Mr. Basketball" Reardon, came from behind to win in the last quarter. How wrong those second guessers were was shown Monday night when the Mount A team nosed out the local students by two points.

One experienced basketball observer told us that the S. D. U. Mount A. game was the closest he ever watched. The score was tied 20 times during the contest. The Saints were never more than four points ahead of the Mounties and the Mounties were never more than three points ahead of the Saints. At the end of the first quarter the Saints were leading 14-12. The score was tied 26-26 at the half and tied 37-37 at the three quarters. With one second to go the score was 52-52. The final whistle blew when the ball was in the air but it dropped through the hoop for the winning two points.

No one denies that Jack Reardon is a great basketball player. His most ardent supporters will tell you that he is the hottest thing to hit the basketball court here in years. Others will champion some other player. But judging by the point scoring records it is doubtful if any other player here ever scored with the same consistency. On Monday night he scored 25 points to boost his total to 103 points for five games. One of those nights some team is going to hold him down to 20 points.

Harry Poulton, the Island and former Maritime welterweight boxing champion, is fighting out of Toronto for the winter months and word from those quarters has it that Harry has a busy time ahead. Last Saturday night Harry fought in Detroit on television but we were unable to find out the result of the bout.

On March 3 Poulton is scheduled to fight Rocky Brisbane in Montreal on the Sandy Saddler-Savoie card. This Brisbane is the same fighter who fought Fritzie Pruden to a draw in Florida a little more than two weeks ago. Following the Brisbane fight, Poulton may go an eight rounder with Alan McFater in Hamilton. McFater, it will be remembered, fought the world lightweight champion Jimmy Cartier several weeks ago and made a splendid showing against him.

Poulton has been working out with both Danny Webb and Gus Rubincsev but confines his training mostly to the latter. A boxer, he

Islanders Back In Second Place Tie With Halifax; Lose To Beavers 7-3

SAINT JOHN, N.B., Feb. 27 (CP)—Saint John Beavers increased their lead in the Maritime Major Hockey League to a mighty 24 points tonight by turning back Charlottetown Islanders 7-3.

The 101-point total for Beavers compares with 77 for second place Charlottetown and Halifax St. Mary's. The Saints tied Islanders by trimming Glace Bay Miners 8-4.

Paid admissions here tonight were 2,844 — the biggest crowd so far this year.

Beavers had a 2-0 lead at the end of the first and never relinquished it in the fast, interesting game. They outscored Islanders 3-2 in the second and 2-1 in the third.

High-scoring Johnny Ubrico led the point-getters with a brace and one assist. Ron Hurst also shot two for Saint John. Tom Smelle, Nick Nicolle and Al Buchanan had singles. The Bob Gray-Buck Whitlock — Jim MacKenzie line of Charlottetown counted twice, with Gray shooting both times, and Hub Beaudry fired the other.

Charlottetown dressed 13 men and Saint John 14.

Ubrico shot both of the first period goals. With little more than a minute gone, his pass across the cage hit Islander Johnny Dutchak's stick and glanced into the nets. Goalie Ray Fredericks wasn't expecting it.

At the half way mark, in a pretty passing play with Tom Smelle and Jack Meldrum, he went through the defence, stick-handled beautifully and beat Fredericks again.

Bob Gray, of Charlottetown, opened the second period scoring after passes by Buck Whitlock and Jim MacKenzie. The puck bounced off a Saint John stick and went past Hal Gordon.

Beavers tallied three within the next six minutes. Tom Smelle worked Fredericks out of position for the third Saint John marker. Then Ray blocked two before Hurst snatched a loose puck from an attack continued as Nicolle flipped a backhander in front of

the cage, making the score 5-1. All three markers were assisted.

The second Charlottetown tally came late in the period right after a faceoff. Helped by Red Favero and Walter Pawlyshyn, Beaudry shot one through a tiny space between a post and Gordon, who didn't see the rubber.

A passout from MacKenzie set up Gray for the third and last Charlottetown goal early in the final period. A similar play enabled Hurst to score. At 17:48 Buchanan shot the best goal of the game. He fired after a solo end to end dash with several Islanders fruitfully trailing him.

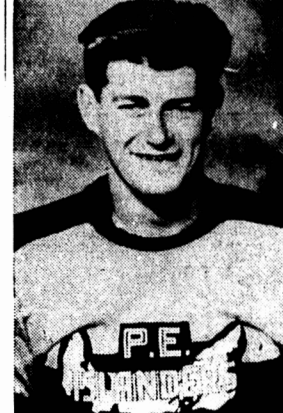

TUCSON, Ariz., Feb. 27 (AP)—Bob Feller today began preparing for his 17th year with Cleveland Indians, four of them spent in the navy, confident he is in for a good season. So is the Tribe management.

Feller, leading pitcher in the American League last year, has his mind set on winning 20 or more games in a season for the seventh time.

"I always aim for 20," he said. The big thing this year is to help pitch Cleveland into the World Series. Then I'd like to win a World Series game."

Feller, at 33, has spent about half his lifetime as a major leaguer. He has been in the American League longer than any of today's stars, and figures he still has several years of top flight competition remaining.

He has won 230 games for Cleveland. "I'd like to raise that to 300," he said today.

Al Lopez, Cleveland manager, is just as optimistic as Feller. "Bob still throws the ball mighty hard, and he's got a good curve," he says.
