

### Exports To U. K. Help To Balance Other Trade

OTTAWA (CP)—Canada still is buying more abroad than she exports but narrowed the trading gap in the first half of the year.

The bureau of statistics reported Wednesday that the deficit in goods and services transactions totalled \$320,000,000 in the first six months. It was down \$45,000,000 from the \$365,000,000 deficit last year.

The bureau said Canada's traditional deficit in transactions with the United States grew larger, but the increase was more than offset by a boost in the surplus position with the United Kingdom as Canadian exports there rose sharply over imports from the U. K. There were smaller surpluses with other countries.

Total receipts for the half year on such things as merchandise exports, gold sales, dividends and freight totalled \$2,659,000,000, up from \$2,413,000,000 last year. Payments on imports of goods and services, including Canadian tourist travel abroad, totalled \$2,979,000,000 as against \$2,778,000,000 last year.

**BALANCE RISES**

The current balance in transactions with the U. K. rose in the half-year period to \$183,000,000 from \$55,000,000 last year. But the deficit with the U. S. increased to \$555,000,000 from \$518,000,000. The surplus with other countries was reduced to \$52,000,000 from \$98,000,000.

Canada's deficit in the first two quarters of the year was lower than the previous year. It was \$162,000,000 in the April-June pe-

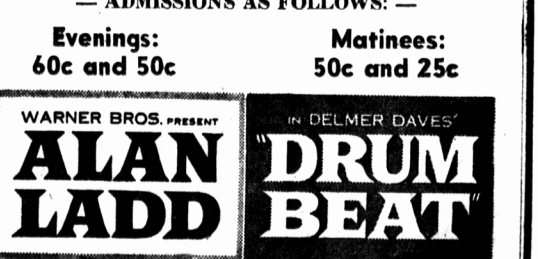
