TRAIN SERVICE PROBLEMS ARE DISCUSSED

Board of Trade Holds Conference With Visiting Railway Commissioners.

Prince Edward Island's railway transportation problems were discussed last night at a meeting of the council of the Charlottetown Board of Trade with Lt.-Col. C. C. Stibbard, chief operating official of the Board of Railway Commissioners, and Mr. D. G. Kilburn also of the Board of Commissioners.

The railway commissioners are here making a study of train service conditions prevailing in the Province.

A resolution passed at a previous meeting of the Board of Trade "requesting efficient service which will fulfill the terms of the Confederation agreement" and "that the department of railways implement in full the recommendations of the Duncan Commission" was read at last night's meeting.

Mr. R. R. Bell, Vice-president of the Board of Trade, who presided pointed out that the Board wished to bring to the attention of the commissioners two things, first, the slowness of the service throughout the province and the poor road bed and equipment.

Mr. E. L. Cotton in a short address told of the service on the Moncton-Charlottetown line. The average speed, he pointed out, was 19.08 miles per hour. That was the speed deducting the amount of time lost in crossing on the car ferry and at the piers on both sides. Pullman service was provided only 64 days out of the year and there were no trains on the service for 52 days in each year; were other points he brought out.

Col. G. E. Pull claimed that the service between Charlottetown and Moncton was served by a local train which stopped at practically all small wayside stations along the way. He suggested that a through train be put on when the summer schedule goes into effect. It could

Railway Fares In United States Sharply Reduced

WASHINGTON, May 4.—A group of large eastern railroads late today filed sharply reduced passenger fares with the Interstate Commerce Commission in conformity with a recent commission order, but reserved the right to challenge the legality of the new rates in the courts.

All major eastern carriers except the Baltimore & Ohio joined in the filing today. The B. & O., previously had filed the new charges in conformity with the commission ruling, and it will not be a party to any court test.

The new rates, fixing fares of 3 cents a mile in pullmans and 2 cents a mile in coaches, are effective June 2.

PARIS, May 4.—(C. P. Cable)—The battle over, France looks quietly ahead.

Leon Blum, Socialist leader, declares the Socialists, who are now the largest party in the Chamber of Deputies, are ready to form and lead a popular government.

Marcus Thores, general secretary of the Communist party, says the rich can now be made to pay by levies on big fortunes. "We shall dissolve the leagues of civil war," he says. "We shall see to the organization of peace on the basis of collective security within the framework of the League of Nations. We have a majority sufficiently large to apply our programme. The members of our party may contemplate the future with joy."

Report Troops Entered City

ROME, May 4.—A reliable source reported tonight an advance guard of Askari (native) Italian troops under the command of General Pirlo Broil entered the suburbs of Addis Ababa late this afternoon.

The report of the entry of the first of the Italian forces came as the government in Rome was reported taking what it believes to be "adequate measures" for the protection and release of foreigners in besieged legations in the Ethiopian capital.

It was believed the capital would be formally occupied tomorrow.

Premier Mussolini intimated that the Italian nation today that the long awaited hour for a victory celebration was at hand.

PROROGATION UNLIKELY BEFORE JUNE

Long List Of Legislation Yet To Be Introduced In Commons.

OTTAWA, May 4.—Parliament will be in session until the middle of June at least, judging from the long list of legislation which the government intends to introduce before prorogation.

Premier Mackenzie King said today legislation would be introduced on election laws, soldier pensions, radio, wheat and possibly railways, depending on reports of committees now investigating each subject. Terms of the bills could not be disclosed until the committees reported.

In addition, he said, the government intended to go ahead with its loan council bill, and make changes in the criminal code involving section 92. It intended also to amend the Customs Act and legislation governing national parks.

There was a possibility, also, the Prime Minister said, minor amendments would be made to the Combines Act, Marketing Act, Drydock Subsidy Act, Proprietary and Patent Medicine Act and the Postoffice Act.

Dr. Robertson Will Return Home Today

He has not been called upon by officials to testify at the inquest into the death of Herman Magill, Toronto barrister who died in the rock prison three days before Stellarton druggmen broke through to save the lives of Dr. Robertson and Alfred Scadding. Magill died of pneumonia, Dr. Glen Donovan of Halifax testified at the inquest which has been adjourned until next Thursday.

Dr. Robertson will be accompanied by Mrs. Robertson and a nurse on the journey to Toronto tomorrow. His physicians believe he is in good physical condition for the trip. Scadding, still in hospital where he is receiving special treatment for "trench feet" was making a "satisfactory recovery" by his physician, Dr. H. K. MacDonald stated this afternoon.

WILL SUBSIDIZE RAILWAYS TO CREATE JOBS

Government Measure To Create Employment Draws Criticism From All Sides.

(C. P. By Guardian's Special Wire) OTTAWA, May 4.—Extensive subsidies for industry were proposed in the House of Commons tonight by Hon. H. H. Stevens, Reconstruction leader, as \$3,100,000 was voted to provide for employment of relief camp workers on railway maintenance work during the summer.

Mr. Stevens asserted and Hon. C. D. Howe, minister of railways, denied, the vote was a straight subsidy to the railway companies. The government was providing the labor for work on the roadways which was long overdue and absolutely essential.

If railways were to be subsidized why not other industries? asked Mr. Stevens. He believed the move was a good one and should be extended. Industries should be subsidized to enable them to modernize their plants and re-employ men who had been laid off.

The vote drew criticism from all quarters of the House as members objected to giving assistance to the Canadian Pacific Railway, to the temporary character of the work and to its possible effect on regular railway workers.

The C. P. R. was not poor, said Robert Finn (Lib., Halifax). It showed profit on its operations and was able to write off large sums for depreciation. He objected to giving the same amount of money to the C. P. R. as to the Canadian National as the govern-

CHURCHES IN SPAIN RAZED

Many Persons Injured In Disorders.

(By H. E. Knoblauch, Associated Press Foreign Staff) MADRID, May 4.—Nearly two score persons were wounded and valuable church property was destroyed today in the most violent anti-clerical rioting in Spain since the Left election victory in February.

Rioters set fire to more than a dozen Roman Catholic churches, schools and monasteries. The violence began yesterday when rumors were spread among fanatics that nuns had distributed poisoned candy to girls in their charge.

Two nuns were wounded when they came into the line of fire as they led children from a burning convent school.

The disorders centred in the capital, but there also were scenes of violence in the province of Cadiz. Heavy forces of shock police were powerless to cope with mobs of rioting extremists.

Strike Called
