MONDAY

Train No. 39, the morning train to Borden, was derailed at Milton on Saturday morning, causing the passengers, none of whom were injured, to be driven to the boat by bus. Railway freight trucks took the baggage and express.

The runoff occurred at the east end of the passing track, about one-quarter of a mile from Milton Station. The train consisted of two Diesels, a box-baggage car, a baggage car and four coaches. Only the engine remained on the track.

Paying his first visit to this Province, Sir Archibald Nye, High Commissioner for Great Britain to Canada, had an opportunity over the week-end of trying Island trout fishing.

A meeting of teachers and interested ratepayers of Anglo-Tinlish, Christopher's Cross and Sea Cow Pond was held recently in Anglo-Tinlish school house, to organize a film council in this area.

Mr. John Martin of the Visual Education Branch, Department of Education, Charlottetown, was guest speaker. Mr. Martin gave a detailed report of how to organize a film council and told of the many benefits to be derived from such an organization.

A business tax, rather than an occupancy tax, will be introduced in the form of a by-law at the next regular meeting of the City Council, it was announced by Mr. Edwin C. Johnston, chairman of the Finance Committee, at a special meeting of the Council held recently.

It was pointed out by Councillor F. J. Storey that in common with urban communities all across Canada this city is increasing at all times and next year there will be a great increase in the costs of education. He said that the increases must be budgeted for even though requirements were met inadequately.

His brief read to the Council stated: "It is true that the services rendered by this corporation are shared almost equally with the many people living in the border areas, by non-taxable government bodies, both of Federal and Provincial complexion, and by many people within this city who do not share equitably the financial burdens."

Flying Officer Melvin Gray, age 24 years, R.C.A.F. Station, Summerside, was drowned on Saturday night at approximately six o'clock in the Grand River, where he and two companions had gone to fish.

The fall occurred near the Grand River bridge, and the two men who were on the fishing trip with him did not witness the tragedy but apparently he had waded out too far into the river, which at that point is narrow and with a steep descent into the channel waters. An unusually strong current prevails there and as far as is known the body was rapidly drawn into the channel stream. He was unable to swim. Members of the R.C.M.P., Summerside detachment, carried on dragging operations throughout Saturday night and Sunday and were assisted by planes of the R.C.A.F. Station in Summerside which flew overhead in an endeavor to spot the body in the water below. The search was continued until last evening and then discontinued without finding any trace of the body.

F. O. Gray was a native of Vancouver, B. C. He was a son of Mrs. Mary Gray and the late Mr. Gray of that place and was unmarried. Next of kin were notified yesterday.

The very great need for export purchases by countries in the dollar area was emphasized by Sir Archibald Nye, British High Commissioner to Canada, during an address before the Rotary Club at the Charlottetown yesterday.

Sir Archibald told of the difficulties of his homeland in trying to recuperate after the terrific manpower losses of two Great Wars. He noted that a great many men were removed from industry because of the two conflicts and added that the necessary conscription of men for peacetime service in the forces had deprived the economy of the country of many necessary workers.

He made no particular plea for help for Britain, but he did ask for a greater understanding by the non-sterling countries of the problems being faced by the country which was and has been willing to take the brunt of initial warfare. He told the large gathering at the luncheon of the manner in which Great Britain was preparing a defense against future aggression so she could no longer be regarded as a "sitting pigeon".

After hearing the evidence of the two witnesses who were with Flying Officer Gray, the jury brought in a verdict that the deceased had lost his life in Grand River on July 18, as a result of accidental drowning.

The body was discovered yesterday morning by Mr. James Winchester of Grand River who conducted a search himself early on Monday morning and discovered the body near the point where it had last been seen.

Tommy Stewart of St. Croix, New Brunswick, a former N. B. P.E.I. amateur golf champion, fired a brilliant 69 over the Charlottetown Golf Course yesterday to lead a field of 164 golfers in the annual B. P. E. I. amateur and open tournament.

Stewart has a two day score of 147, three strokes more than runner-up Bob Gray of Charlottetown who shot a 78 yesterday.

Steady Art MacKenzie of Charlottetown, playing the most brilliant golf of his career, yesterday won the N. B. P. E. I. Amateur and Open Golf Championships by defeating runner-up Bob Gray by a single stroke after 73 holes of gruelling tournament play.

The 30-year-old MacKenzie, who was once a caddy at the Belvedere Golf Course, sank a 20-foot putt on the 73 rd. hole for a birdie three to win the coveted championship. Gray had a par four on the hole.

The two Charlottetown club members finished the regulation 72 holes of tournament play with identical scores of 288. MacKenzie fired a par 72 on his last round while Gray had a one-over 73.

A short resume of agricultural conditions in Great Britain was given yesterday by Mr. R. C. Parent as he told a meeting of the Agricultural Institute of Canada of his recent visit to Europe. Mr. Parent said that since the last war farming output in England, particularly had risen by 80 percent.

This he attributed to the fact that adequate prices for the products were set for the year in advance and the Ministry of Agriculture insisted on quality production. In speaking of livestock he noted that in Great Britain there are three times as many head of livestock per acre as there are here.

Island swinebreeders attending a most interesting comments of Mr. J. G. LeFebvre as he told of the development of the industry in Denmark from which country Great Britain is now importing most of its bacon. He said that the type now produced there gives a Whitehead with light forelegs and heavy gammons and they are both uniform and light in back fat.

The Hon. James Sinclair, Minister of Fisheries, announced yesterday that the government's plan to provide voluntary low cost protection to lobster fishermen against losses of traps from storms will go into effect in Lobster Fishing District 4 at noon August 1.

This district includes the waters off the Northumberland Strait shores of Prince County, P.E.I., Kent and Westmorland counties, N.B., and part of Cumberland County, N.S.

The plan is being announced now, the Minister said, so that lobster fishermen will have time to make application to have their traps counted before the opening day of the season. A specially-trained group of Department of Fisheries officers will be in the area to carry out duties associated with the Plan. Application forms will be available from all Departmental offices in the area. Handbooks which will inform the lobster fishermen of all the important aspects of the Plan will also be available for distribution.

The plan is open to any lobster fisherman who owns and operates at least 32 lobster traps. It will pay \$1.50 per trap lost other than through normal wear and tear which has been calculated to be 25 per cent per year. The premium is 7 1/2 cents per trap owned. For 300 traps, for example a fisherman would pay a premium of \$22.50. If he loses 200 traps during the season from any cause other than willful damage or gross negligence, he receives \$187.50 for 125 of the lost traps. The other 75 represents the 25 per cent of the total which is deducted for normal wear and tear.

FRIDAY

Installation of 70 street lights is expected to get underway shortly in Parkdale following a meeting held there last night during which the Village Commissioners were empowered to complete a contract for them. The motion to this effect was made by Commissioner H. Hennessey and was seconded from the floor by Mr. D. J. MacSkill.

There was some debate and slight opposition, but the motion was carried by a wide margin.

Another matter of importance to Parkdale residents arose when the subject of paving roads came under discussion. A statement was made by the Commissioners that Hon. B. Earle MacDonald, M.L.A., Fifth Queen's, had pledged the Government to lay one mile of pavement in Parkdale in 1953. It was believed that the work would get underway shortly.

"Unfortunately, or fortunately, the Duke was on our side of the Royal coach, but we got a good view of the Queen," said Miss Frances Pendergast of Kensington, telling of her view of the coronation parade from a well-placed stand on Oxford street.

Telling of her visit to England as one of 50 Canadian girls who were guests of Mr. Garfield Weston, her charming and witty comments, on the coronation parade and on the tour which included Paris, Versailles and Dieppe as well as England, Ireland and Scotland, thrilled and delighted her audience at Irishtown Hall July 14, when members of the branches of St. Mark's, Kensington, St. Thomas, New London and Sea View, were guests of St. Stephen's Women's Auxiliary of the Church of England.

"The Queen," she said, "looked as a Queen should," and of the Princess Margaret, her comment was, "I think she's beautiful." Most amazing was the great coach, which in size and elaborate detail, no view on screen or picture could give any idea.

That this Island has the greatest population density and is also the most agricultural Province in Canada were pointed out in a preliminary report on soil conservation at the annual meeting of the Agricultural Institute of Canada which ended its sessions at the Vocational School yesterday.

The report outlined the background of the subject and also told the reasons for a program of conservation and what might be accomplished by it. It stated that the Province contains 1,400,000 acres of which 84 per cent are privately owned. The population density is 43.5 per square mile with 53.7 percent of the people living on farms.

It was noted that though over 315,000 acres are classed as woodland there are no extensive forest areas. The farm woodlots vary considerably in size and it was stated that a surprisingly large number of farmers are now burning coal or oil and as a result neglecting their woodlots. In this connection the report noted that while we are cutting pitprops and pulp indiscriminately we are also spending large sums on sawn lumber for building.
