The New House of Commons.

MARKED DIMINUTION OF THE NUMBER OF TITLED MEMBERS.

It is not a little significant that there should be in the new Parliament a marked falling off in the number of members who are connected with either the Peerage or the Baronage. Both Liberals and Conservatives have suffered in this way almost equally strikingly and equally unexpectedly, and hence it may be fairly inferred that the discomfiture they have experienced has been due rather to their social position than their political views. In the House of 1880 there were three Irish peers, five-and-thirty eldest sons of peers, eight-and-forty younger sons of peers, seventy baronets, and more than two hundred of their near connections by blood or marriage. In the House of 1885 there is only one Irish peer, while there are under twenty eldest sons of peers, under fifty younger sons of peers, under fifty baronets, and about one hundred and fifty of their kindred by consanguinity or affinity, although there were candidates enough and to spare. No doubt the names of many of the chief territorial houses are still to be found among those of the members. The celebrated passage in which Lord Beaconsfield described the division by which Sir Robert Peel was turned out of office in 1846 might still be adopted, with substantial additions, in speaking of the New House of Commons. In it there will be found the Mannerses, the Bentincks, the Lowthers, the Stanleys, and the Lennoxes, the Cavendishes, the Grosvenors, the Gowers, the Greys, and the Fitzwilliams—but not in their former strength; while the "great governing families" of Russell, Campbell, and Somerset are left, for the first time for perhaps a century and a half, without any representative at all. On the other hand, the Hamiltons will be almost as numerous as they were in the household of Frederick Prince of Wales. An obvious effect of the general reduction in the class of members who usually enter Parliament young has been to assist in raising the average age of the members, who, with the exception of a proportion of Mr. Parnell's followers, are nearly all in mature life and something more.—London World.

Valuable Personal Supervision.

Lord Tollemache, says the British Live Stock Journal, celebrated his 80th birthday on Monday week. He has completely recovered from the serious illness which he passed through a short time since and is able to personally attend to the improvements which he is constantly making on the Peckforton estate. Lord Tollemache possesses about 35,000 acres of land in Cheshire, and it is a most striking testimony to the value of his supervision that during the whole of the agricultural depression from 1877 to 1885, his lordship had neither a vacant farm nor a tenant in arrears. His estate in Cheshire has during his lifetime been cut up into farms of about 200 acres in extent, his lordship considering that a thrifty farmer with sons and daughters could do excellently on a 200-acre farm, while they would suffer severely on a smaller holding. In order to break up his estate into farms of that size he built, or rebuilt, between 50 and 60 farmhouses at the cost of £148,000, each of these farms or homesteads costing Lord Tollemache about £2,800. In addition to this, Lord Tollemache has built no fewer than 260 cottages for the accommodation of his labourers.

It is said that in addition to the \$800,000,000 in gold in the Bank of England, there are also 400,000 acres of the most valuable land in England, awaiting the heirs of the Chase and Townley estates.
