RCAP Police Hectle Sit-Downers At Base

LA MACAZA, Que. (CP) — RCAP police apparently were recording loudly and heckling rain-soaked peace demonstrators Tuesday night to prevent them from taking trucks slewing during their 48-hour vigil protesting the storage of nuclear weapons at La Macaza air force base. The demonstrators also said some of the police have handled demonstrators in a rough manner.

Charges Laid Against 6 In Montreal Demonstration

MONTREAL (CP) — Charges were laid Tuesday against 36 of the 78 young persons arrested during a wild Labor Day demonstration in midtown Montreal when flags were burned, cars overturned and a policeman beaten about the face. All but three pleaded guilty to charges of obstructing police officers and were sentenced to jail, were set free on Monday. Twenty-one received time-limited sentences, and were released. The others were fined \$10 after police noted they had criminal backgrounds.

Thousands Flee Hurricane Fury

CAPE KENNEDY, Fla. (AP) — Hurricane Dora lashed Cape Kennedy and other parts of Florida's coast in midsection with gales Tuesday, a foretaste of a 125-mile-an-hour punch expected later. Thousands of persons departed from beach cottages and oceanfront hotels as Dora churned relentlessly toward the coast, pushing a 10-foot tide. Two U.S. navy flyers were killed when their plane crashed as they took off from Sanford, Fla. to escape Dora.

Living Costs Drop Slightly Figures Show

OTTAWA (CP) — Slight decreases in the cost of food, clothing and transportation contributed to a lowering of the cost of living in Canada at August 1, stood at 136.1, down from 136.2 at July 1, up 2.2 points from the year-earlier mark of 123.9.

Liner Battered By Hurricane

SOUTHAMPTON, England (Reuters) — The 81,000-ton Cunard liner Queen Mary 2, docked here Tuesday afternoon, was battered by the centre of hurricane Cleo while crossing the Atlantic from New York. Passengers were thrown about, crockery smashed and furniture damaged as Cleo buffeted the liner.

DORA NEARS FLORIDA COAST

At 6 o'clock last night hurricane Dora was located by the weather bureau in Miami at about 225 miles east of Cape Kennedy and moving west at about 16 miles per hour. Hurricane warnings were extended from Brunswick, Ga. to Stuart, Fla. to the south. Present count of Dora would take the centre to the coast near Cape Kennedy.
