Mahmoud Sets New Record In Derby Victory

Second Successive Win For Aga Khan In Turf Classic; Taj Akbar Places Second

EPSOM DOWNS, England, May 27—Mahmoud proved himself a worthy son of a great sire as he raced to a record-time victory today in the Derby, England's classic, carrying to the front the silks of the Aga Khan.

MAJOR TRIUMPH

While it was a major triumph for the Aga Khan, there were disappointments for two others. Lord Astor, who has yet to win a derby, failed again this year as his Pay Up, the 5 to 1 favorite at post time, finished fourth.

New Record

Mahmoud's time was 2 minutes 33 4-5 seconds, a new record for the route of 1 1-2 miles five yards. He clipped one-fifth of a second of the old mark set in 1933 by Hyperion and equalled in 1934 by Windsor Lad.

Twenty-two horses in all ran following Pay Up came his rival, owned by Lord Carnarvon. Fearless Fox was sixth, Mendicant Friar seventh, Walvis Bay eighth, Magnet ninth, Bel Aethel tenth and Midstream 11th. Convert was last.

Favorite Weakens

Pay Up was among the leaders until the closing stages of the race, when he weakened. A brilliant sun shone over the Epsom course as more than 500,000 watched the 157th renewal of the great open race for three year olds.

The absence of the King and other members of the Royal family, owing to court mourning, deprived the event of some of its customary color.

Nationals Defeat Tip Tops In Close Game Of Industrial Ball League

Bearing down well in the pinches when his mates wobbled behind him big Tull Morrison last night pitched the Nationals to a 7-6 victory over the Tip Tops in an Industrial League baseball encounter. Hard fought and close throughout Nationals came through with the deciding tally in the last half of the ninth after the losers had scored three times in their half of the same inning to knot the count at 6-all. Active Yachting Season Looms In Province

Prince Edward Island's first sailing vessel built to conform with regulations for Class 3 yachts laid down by the newly formed Northumberland Straits Yacht Racing Association has been launched in Charlottetown by Mr. Simon Paol, Jr.

The yacht will get its first taste of competition during Pictou, N. S., lobster carnival, June 6-11, when the first contest of the season will be held by the Northumberland Strait Association.

Mr. Paol's craft was built by Mac Irwin, local yachtsman. Other boats of the same class are under construction at Summerside, Shediac, N. B., and for a Moncton, N. B. sailor. All will see action during the coming season.

Island yachts expected to race in the Pictou events are Ghost, owned by Dr. H. Johnson, Montserrat, owned by Eric Coffin, Montserrat, P-No, Gordon Coffin, Saint John.

Northumberland Strait Yacht Racing Association will stage its championship regatta at Shediac during the month of August.

The latest addition to Charlottetown's yacht fleet measures 22 feet over all, has a 16 foot water line, 6 foot beam, with a hollow spar, 4 foot keel, 28 feet above deck. She has a displacement of 1600 lbs., 600 lbs. of it being lead on a fin keel, she carries 200 feet of canvas.

The classifications laid down by the Yacht Racing Association of the Northumberland Straits for six classes are as follows:
Yachts shall be classified as set out below but this classification may be changed at an annual meeting of the Association.

This table applies to yachts owned by members of clubs belonging to the Association that were built before Feb. 6, 1936. Duplicates of these yachts may be built and raced in same classes as old ones providing permission is obtained from the executive and no changes are made that are not approved by the executive.

This table applies to all yachts bought, built or chartered after Feb. 6, 1936, except as stated under table 1.

Class 1—up to 13 ft. 11 in. 100 sq. feet.
Class 2—14 to 17 ft. 11 in. 150 sq. feet.
Class 3—18 to 22 ft. 200 sq. feet.
Class 4—22 ft. 1 in. to 29 ft. 11 in. 300 sq. feet.
Class 5—30 to 35 feet ft. 11 in. 450 sq. feet.
Class 6—Over 36 feet 600 sq. feet.

Special restrictions to yachts in class 3 under table 2.
Beam shall not be less than 6 ft. L. W. L. shall not be more than 18 feet with crew ashore. Mast shall not exceed 26 ft. from goose-neck to top sheave. Any yacht racing in class 2 shall carry a total of not less than two persons or more than three.

In class 1-2-3 spinnakers shall not be used during races.
Should a yacht have a sail area greater than allowed a yacht of her length she may be assigned to the class next above and should her sail area be below the minimum allowed for her class her owner may apply to the executive to be placed in the next class below subject to the ruling of the executive.

On the first day of the annual meet the class races are to be run off. All heats to be as near as possible from 3 to 6 knots long and three heats raced. Winner to be yacht getting greatest number of points counting 1 point for finishing, plus one point for each yacht defeated plus 1-4 point for finishing first. A cup to be presented to the winners to hold for one year or until new champion declared.

Races on second day to determine Association Champion. This is to be a handicap event, each class to be handicapped by the executive on their showing during the class races. Should any one of more yachts in any class show a decided superiority in their class the executive may allot it or them a special appropriate handicap. All yachts to start together. Three heats of approximately 3 to 6 knots each to be raced. Points to be scored as in class races. Cup to be presented to winner to hold for one year or until new champion declared.

The executive may reduce the number of heats raced on either day due to weather conditions or other causes.
All winning yachts to be re-measured before cups are awarded.
