Provincial Planner Quits; Local Board Needs Head

Provincial Town Planner Walter de Silva has accepted a new post in Halifax and resigned yesterday as provincial planner here. His leaving will leave the government without a qualified planning head, government circles said.

It is expected he will assume his new duties shortly after the first of the new year. Reports say he will be chief regional planner for the Halifax-Dartmouth and Halifax County planning commission recently set up under an act of the last session of the Nova Scotia Legislature.

Mr. de Silva, who began his duties here January 1, 1960, came originally to make a Charlottetown housing study under a three-way agreement between the city, province and Central Mortgage and Housing Corp. On completion of his report he was retained on a permanent basis by the provincial government.

During his four years in this province he succeeded in completely re-planning the so-called Brighton area comprising 200 acres which permitted a large number of additional building lots and a consequent increase in the city tax potential. He also prepared a master plan for future development of the city, but it has not yet been adopted.

ACHIEVEMENTS
One of his outstanding planning achievements is considered to be his work in locating the new provincial building, with its series-type design of erection, within the city on the block which houses old West Keat School.

He also succeeded in having the provincial government purchase 70 acres of land on outskirts of the city for Vocational School use and the development plan he prepared for the entire area has been adopted.

Mr. de Silva also was largely instrumental in preparing new restrictive regulations regarding property fronting on the Trans Canada Highway to offset pressure to have sections of it marked "SLOW". He felt if traffic were to be slowed on the main all-weather artery the province would be forced to build an alternate road in order to speed movement of highway shipments to and from the island.

Almost under his official duties, he has given a vast amount of free service and advice to many island communities in their planning problems and has assisted in properly planning over 300 sub-divisions in the province.

MAJOR STUDY
Prior to the pasting of the new Nova Scotia legislation, a major housing study of the whole Halifax area was carried out and one of the recommendations made in the report was the setting up of a regional planning organization. This would create machinery for joint action by the Halifax-Dartmouth areas on matters of common interest and avoid duplication and waste. Mr. de Silva will be chief planner.

Highly trained in his profession—and a top architect—he is a British subject and a native of Ceylon. A graduate of Ceylon Technical College, Colombo, he also graduated from Hammersmith School of Architecture, University College and the University of London, all of them in England. He is a member of the Royal Architectural Institute of Canada and has served on the Council of the Town Planning Institute of Canada. In addition he has been a member of the 1967 Montreal World Fair.

Married and the father of a three-year-old son, he recently completed building his new home on Admiral Street, where he and Mrs. de Silva now live with their son.
