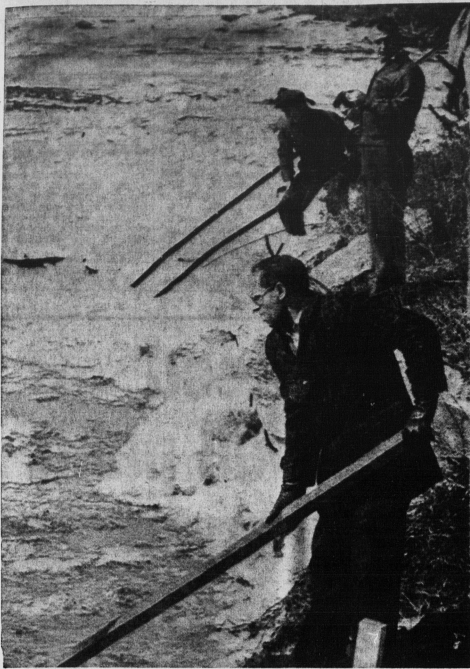


VOLUNTEERS SEEK MISSING BOY

Algerian Bloodshed Is Being Forgotten

By ANDREW BOROWICZ ALGIERS (AP)—In the darkness, machine-gun fire rattled and ambulance sirens screamed. A clandestine transmitter hoarsely warned that all men and women should fight to keep Algeria French.

That was a year ago, when the European Secret Army Organization was fighting its bloody last-ditch battle of terror. The Evian accords for Algerian independence were signed a year ago last week and today Algeria is independent. A Western waiter who swore vengeance once belonged to a European rich-linger. He bows low before new patrons—technicians arriving from France to replace the settlers.

A European who helped to organize the clandestine broadcasts is back in the city, working in the same office with former terrorists of the Moslem National Liberation Front.

FEELS NO GUILT "It's all history now," he says, shrugging his shoulders. "You see, I didn't kill anybody, I feel no guilt. The broadcasts? Everybody has forgotten about them."

Mac Faces Two Votes

LONDON (Reuters)—The electoral popularity of Prime Minister Macmillan's Conservative government will be tested twice this week and observers expect the ruling party to get some more shocks.

The tests come in parliamentary by-elections at Rotherham in Yorkshire and Swansea in Wales, and in both it looks as though the opposition Labour party will retain its hold on the seats with ease.

Cuban Diplomat Ousted By Chile

SANTIAGO, Chile (AP)—Chile expelled a Cuban diplomat Monday at the climax of a cloak-and-dagger whirl involving secret documents, foreign agents, false identities and a plane crash that took 40 lives.

Foreign Minister Carlos Marinés Sotomayor said Cuban embassy secretary Alfredo García Almeyda has been declared persona non grata (unwelcome) and given until Wednesday night to leave Chile.

He said the expulsion order was issued because García Almeyda, "in a behavior unbecom-

ing an accredited foreign diplomat, changed his name before Chilean officials and impersonated a Chilean citizen."

The expulsion order had been expected since Saturday, when Chilean police sources said García Almeyda tried to cross into Peruvian territory posing as a Chilean citizen, to try to recover Cuban secret documents believed found in the wreckage of a crashed plane.

Sources close to the government said the García Almeyda incident "is another straw" in the deterioration of Chilean-Cuban relations. Chile is one of the five Latin American countries still maintaining diplomatic relations with the Fidel Castro regime. The others are Bolivia, Brazil, Mexico and Uruguay.

García Almeyda was among several Cuban diplomats who rushed to the Peruvian border from here and La Paz after a Bolivian plane crashed March 15 with two Cuban diplomatic couriers aboard.

They wanted to recover secret documents which the couriers were reported carrying, but were unable to get into Peru because that country has no diplomatic relations with Cuba. The crash, in which all 40 persons aboard were killed, took place in Peruvian territory just a few miles from the Chilean and Bolivian borders.

Lima Newspapers said last Friday the Cubans may have tried to commandeer the plane, causing the crash.

The Communist party and the leftist press in Chile have charged that agents of the U.S. Central Intelligence Agency sabotaged the plane to get the Cuban documents.

Hamilton Uses Mailing Frank For Statements

OTTAWA (CP)—Copies of three statements have been sent out under the mailing frank of Agriculture Minister Hamilton, special assistant Roy Faibish said Monday.

"As long as the minister makes speeches, political or non-political, containing statements of agricultural policy, they will be sent out under his frank," Mr. Faibish said.

"It's a matter of propriety, not law," he was commenting on reports

ports that Mr. Hamilton was using Parliament's free mailing privileges to dispense political material during the April 8 election campaign.

Mr. Faibish said one mailing was of a non-political speech in Winnipeg. A second was of a political speech in Moose Jaw.

A third contained an extract from a policy statement by Prime Minister Diefenbaker made during the current campaign about eastern farm policy.

Franking privileges for ordinary members of Parliament end 10 days after dissolution of Parliament. Those for cabinet ministers continue until their resignation, whether actually elected or not.

WASHINGTON (AP)—The Senate gave overwhelming approval Monday to President Kennedy's nomination of Franklin D. Roosevelt Jr., as U.S. under-secretary of commerce. Confirmation came on a voice vote with Senator Winston L. Prouty (Rep., Vt.) and several other Republicans registering dissent.
