Art MacKenzie Wins P.E.I. Golf Tourney; Edges Out Dowling

Art MacKenzie of Charlottetown won the provincial amateur golf championship in the final 18 holes of play over the Summerside Golf Club course on Saturday with a gross for the 18 holes of 80. He edged out the defending champion, Maurice Dowling who had an 81. Each had completed the first 18 holes in Charlottetown a week previously with a 75.

The best score of the day was chalked up by Pud Beer with a 78 which earned him third place in the tournament. Norman MacLeod led the Summerside golfers with an 80 and placed fourth.

Beer shot both the out going and final nine in 39 which is three over par for the nine hole course. MacKenzie had an identical score in the first nine but finished with a 41. Dowling started slow with a 42 but finished with a 39.

There was a strong wind blowing which made it difficult to judge approaches and some drives were dropping short. It got quite dark in the afternoon and it was feared that rain might spoil the tournament.

Large Attendance At Swimming, Diving Meet

Hundreds of spectators lined the waterfront along the Victoria Park driveway Saturday afternoon to witness the Queens County Swimming and Diving Meet, the first to be held here for many years, which proved to be a highly successful and competitive program under the sponsorship of the Charlottetown Y's Men's Club.

With boys and girls, men and women, competing for top honors in the various divisions, spectators were treated to some really exciting swimming feats that lacked nothing in the way of excitement and entertainment, many of the winning contestants receiving hearty applause by the large crowd for their fine performances.

Making a clean sweep of the Men's open swimming events, Mr. Frank Schanlel of Czechoslovakia, now a resident of this City, gave an excellent performance in grace and speed in the water when he captured firsts in the 100 yard breast stroke, 100 yard free style and 100 yard back stroke. Mr. Schanlel's performance in the latter event, a difficult one for even a champion, was truly beautiful to watch and the distance was covered in the fast time of one minute and 23 seconds. Schanlel's times for the breast stroke and free style were 1:30 and 1:12 2-5 respectively.

As the result of recent friendly exhibition tennis matches between the Charlottetown Tennis Club and members of the R.C.A.F. Station at Summerside, the two groups got their heads together following a series of matches at the "Port" yesterday, and have decided to sponsor a Provincial Closed Tournament which they hope to launch this week.

Although the two groups realize that the tourney is coming into effect rather unexpectedly before other clubs at Summerside and Charlottetown have been given much notice, it is their intention to inform the other clubs immediately and invite their participation in the play.

It is hoped that the tourney will get underway either Wednesday or Thursday of this week and in view of this, all entries must be in hand by Tuesday night. All individual players or clubs may make their applications to J.E. Wran, City, president of the local club, or to tennis officials at the airport.

The scheduled game in City Minor Baseball League competition tonight will be a clash between the West and North End Bantams of the Bantam League which will get underway at the Old Diamond, Victoria Park at 5:30. The youngsters, who have only had their league rolling a short time, have been coming up with smart ball and it is expected that tonight's encounter will be one of the best to date.

In connection with the same group, officials announced last night that they will hold a meeting at the Travel Bureau this evening at 7:15 for all players in the City of Midget League age, who are not already playing on an organized team in the present league setup. The idea is to give all those who have not had a chance to play to date, but want to, to form a fourth team or if necessary, a fifth, to compete in the League.

Did you know that there is only one exception in baseball to free substitution? That is what Billy Evans tells us in his "Knotty Problems of Baseball", and he should know after 22 years service as an umpire in the American League. But to get the full story, here are the details as tabulated in propiem form.

"The home team had a big inning in which it scored ten runs. The rally was started by a pinch-hitter sent in to bat for the pitcher. At that time the home team was trailing 6-0. The pinch-hitter doubled to start the rally. Naturally, the pinch-hitter was up again in the big inning and once more favored with a two-base hit. Prior to his second time at bat, the manager debated as to whether he would have another substitute bat for the first pinch-hitter, since the original pinch-hitter, a lefthander, faced a southpaw pitcher. Would this have been permissible?"

"In a ball game there is free substitution for all players, except in the case where a pitcher is announced to take over the hurling duties. In all such cases the pitcher must face one batsman until he has either been retired or reached first base, the side is retired, or the pitcher sustains an injury which in the judgment of the umpires, incapacitates him from pitching.

"It is unusual for a pinch-hitter to come up twice in the same inning, and even more unusual for him to hit safely both times. It would have been permissible for the manager to have inserted a pinch-hitter for the original pinch-hitter on his second time up had he so desired. Such action would have simply dropped the original pinch-hitter from the lineup."

A total of 59 top pacing and trotting entries pounded it out over the excellently conditioned Exhibition Speedway on Saturday night to come up with a smart brand of racing in a featured nine, one-mile dash night racing program that was action-packed all the way and gave a large crowd of racing enthusiasts plenty of excitement and entertainment.

Johnny Kalmuck's performance in the third event was one of the big thrills of the evening, when owner and driver Walter Kelly guided him to a sensational win in the final position in the seven-horse field at the half. Kelly brought his charge up two positions by the time he hit the three-quarters at the upper turn to bring him out from there for a startling last quarter drive down the home stretch to victory. Not content with the single victory, Kelly brought his Kalmuck horse home a winner again in the seventh event to be one of the four double winners on the night's card.

The terrific battle between A. G. Scott and Josedale Clipper in the ninth and final race, was also one of the leading track battles of the night. Making it a continual battle for the lead position over practically every inch of the mile distance, it was Clipper by a nose and then A. G. by the same margin all around until the final quarter. Clipper, in the lead at that point had to give way to Lorne Letcher's A. G. Scott who took over in a torrid battle from there in to be the winning horse, while Filbert flashed past driver James MacGregor at the wire for second place to leave the game Josedale Clipper in third. A. G. Scott also won the fifth race with Josedale and Filbert pressing close in that order.

The other events were also smart exhibitions of racing and driving, with Calumet Onward and driver Harold Stead coming up with their usual steady performance to clip off win honors in both the fourth and eighth dashes, while Len O'Meara guided Commander Buntain's Miss Knox in ahead of a tough eight.

For Speed and Efficiency in the Water Fundamental Movements Must Be Mastered

Miss Joan Wood, Red Cross Instructor, demonstrates the crawl stroke. Notes for Lesson No. 1 that the right hand is trailing off prior to the shoulder lift. The elbow carries high during the entire recovery. The left arm is gliding out and down following the natural curve of the upper surface of the arm bringing the elbow uppermost and producing an "over-the-barrel" grab.

The Crawl Stroke

The perfect American crawl is probably the best demonstration of speed and efficiency in the water. It combines a complete overhand stroke with a powerful flutter kick as well as other important skills. It is the swimming skill that the average person may acquire only with competent supervision and diligent practise. The co-ordination of arm and leg movements with rhythmic breathing and complete relaxation are all extremely important in assuming an efficient crawl. Try to master these skills by strict attention to the fundamental movements.

Description of Arm Action

Starting with your arm entering the water, allow your hand to reach forward and downward several inches below the surface. Catch the water with your hand and forearm and pull backwards keeping your elbow bent. Here you should feel a drawing motion rather than a downward pressing effort. When your arm has reached the position directly below your shoulder allow it to relax and drift backward to the thigh. Then quickly withdraw your arms from the water with your elbow held high. The momentum of this motion comes from the shoulder muscles. Carry your arm forward quickly and plunge your hand into the water just beyond your head while your elbow is still held high. Now extend your shoulder and keep your elbow raised slightly until your hand reaches the position roughly six inches below the surface. When your shoulder extends with a flowing motion a drive is produced which will add greatly to your relaxation in the water.
