For example: Do we also have "peculiar antiquated ideas of what an older person is?" Do we believe, "older persons can't take criticism, are not progressive, can't supervise others, can't learn, are not ambitious?" This report claims that actual research has discovered that "these are myths."

A large part of the report is concerned with the automatic retirement of individuals when they reach a certain age, and the failure of the older workers to get another job when they lose their customary one because of normal slowing down, or for other reasons. And what can be worse for morale than to be turned away by one employer after another with the words, "You are too old." The Island is not an industrial area, though other parts of Canada are increasingly so, and this is not a large scale problem here, but it probably plays a part in many individual cases.

A survey made of 59 countries in 1950-1951, by the New York committee, shows that "nowhere in the world do employers generally, equate the plus factors of age, such as experience, judgment, know-how, with the energy, adaptability and growth prospects of younger job seekers."
