# Liberal Minded Canadian Will Be Sought By Two Parties

By ARCH MACKENZIE - Canadian Press Staff Writer OTTAWA (CP)—The Liberal-minded voter will be ardently courted by at least two of Canada's political parties over the next year or so. Both the Liberals and the yet-unnamed party being formed by the CCF and the Canadian Labor Congress want to collect as many as possible. Liberal Leader Lester B. Pearson issued an invitation to this group of voters when the National Liberal Federation's advisory council held its annual meeting here recently. He suggested a 1960 rally of all "liberal-minded" people and the council immediately adopted the proposal. This is a direct attempt to head off support for the new party, says Carl Hamilton, CCF executive secretary and member of the CCF-CLC national committee for the new party that met here last week.

AGREE ON PLATFORM - Among other things, the committee agreed on suggested ideas for party platform and considered purposes before the new party actually is formed. The Liberals have named a national organizer in James Scott, one of several steps taken, and the new party sponsors have adopted something of a counter part in Desmond Sparham who is called director of "new party clubs."

These clubs are units to band the faithful together and collect new members. They serve as discussion centres where the suggested platform and constitutional details can be kicked around after being published in booklet form next month.

NEW JEWISH DAILY - The Canadian Jewish News, first Jewish weekly published in English in Ontario, will begin rolling off the presses here Jan. 3. Editor of the eight-page publication is Meyer J. Nurenburger, former editor of the Daily Hebrew Journal in Toronto and the Jewish Morning Journal of New York.

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TO PRESENT BRIEF - QUEBEC (CP) - Students of Laval University are planning to present a brief to Premier Sauve next March, it is stated in the latest issue of Le Carabin, the student newspaper. Object of the brief will be "to point out present education problems in the province" and to ask that a royal commission of inquiry make a deep study of problems, the newspaper says.

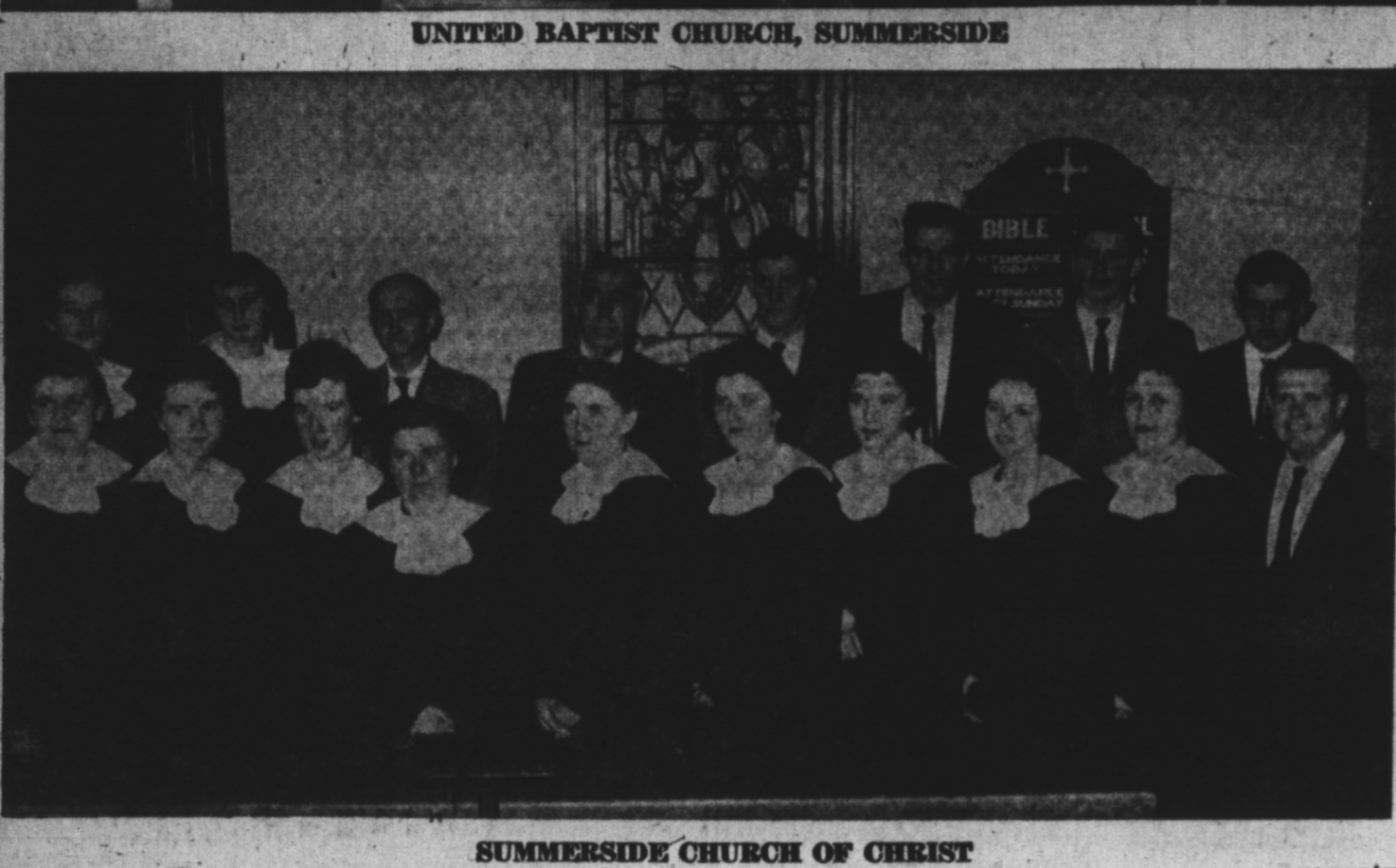

## AGRICULTURAL NEWS

P.E.I. Department of Agriculture

Christmas message from the Minister of Agriculture, The Honorable W.R. Shaw.

There's no gift so real as the gift of friendship. No jewel so priceless as man's good will to man. How natural it is at this season of the year, therefore, to speak of friendship when we celebrate the birth of the Prince of Peace. We trust that the Department of Agriculture's relationship with the farmers it serves may always be in the spirit of the Golden Rule—"Do unto others as you would have others do unto you."

Our work is so much a part of the continual miracle of birth. May we be ever mindful of the responsible part we play in helping farmers to obtain better production and making this a better world in which to live. The years roll by, friends come and go, and with the birth of the New Year and New Friendships, we realize how much it means to have shared the friendships of folks like you, and it is a joy to wish you and those dear to you a Merry Christmas and a New Year of health and prosperity.

### HOG PAYMENTS

Several months ago the Canada Department of Agriculture announced a system for hog deficiency payments. During the month of November registration cards were forwarded to all those who had shipped hogs during the last three years to either of the two main Maritime Plants. At that time these hog raisers were urged to fill in these registration cards and forward them to the district office.

If you have mislaid the card or did not receive one you should apply to the Canada Department of Agriculture Marketing Branch, Dominion Building, Charlottetown for a registration card. When this card is completed and turned in you will receive a registration number.

After January the 11th, all hogs marketed should be done so in the owners name along with his registration number. If the operation is a father son set up this does not entitle both the father and son to separate accounts. The farm would be registered under one name. Actually the registration is not with the Canada Department of Agriculture but with the Agricultural Stabilization Board.

The support level based on Montreal, Toronto, and the Maritimes, will still be in effect, that is, 23.65 cents. The deficiency payment will be determined on the difference between the support price and the average price over the year, that is, from January the 1st to December the 31st. No doubt you probably have seen the figure 23.64 cents. This represents the weighted average price on a national level.

Deficiency payments will be paid to all producers on upwards to one hundred hogs on A and B grade. Of course you will have to have registered and use your registration number when marketing the hogs. Make sure

that you always use the same name when you are marketing.

**INVENTORY**  
It won't be long now before you will see many of the stores in town closed for their annual stock-taking or inventory. Why do you suppose that they do this?

Well, the difference of the beginning inventory and the ending inventory is the easiest way a firm has of determining its sales for the year and to determine its worth.

An inventory, then, is an itemized list of your stock of goods showing quantities and values. Every business takes an inventory, so why not the farmer. An inventory is sometimes called good business sense.

Inventories are useful for several reasons. They tell you the worth of each asset and the sum value of your assets give you the value of your business. The difference between your total assets and liabilities gives you the net worth of your business.

Net income cannot be determined accurately without the use of an inventory. For example, a portion of your production which may not be sold at the end of the accounting year is just as much a part of income as crops and livestock sold during the year. An increase in inventory is counted as business credits, while

a decrease in inventory is counted as business debits.

An inventory can be taken in two steps. The first is the actual count of the assets. This accounts for all assets used in the operation of your business including livestock, buildings, equipment, supplies on hand, etc.

The second step in inventory taking is that of valuation of each asset. Guides which can be used in determining the worth of an asset include market price, cost price, depreciation to date, etc. In any case, the valuation should give a conservative net worth of the business.

The beginning inventory for one year will naturally be the ending inventory for the previous year. The closing inventory accounts for all changes in the amount of your assets and changes in value due to new additions to buildings, etc. and an allowance for depreciation.

If you are not in the habit of keeping a set of records for your business, why not start now, and it would be a good idea if you started with an inventory.

**WINTERIZE YOUR COW**  
Cows are more complicated than cars and should be readied for winter. It's the season of highest food and labor costs and a drop in milk production is difficult to build up again. "Take a careful inventory of the herd."

"Cull out animals that are mastitis or diseased or can no longer produce profitably. Even a though a farmer may have sufficient hay and grain only cows that will produce at a relatively high level during the next six months will make a satisfactory return."

Many new heifers will be going

into the milking string at this time of year. Stanchions, stalls, barn feeding and close contact with the dairyman will be strange experiences to them. Manage first-calf heifers carefully so that they do not become nervous. It is good practice to put them in with the milking herd before they freshen.

Take time to brush them and lightly massage their udders and teats. If this is done, when it is time to put the milker on they will usually not be nervous. It will be time well spent for the farmer with a milking parlor to let heifers make several trips through the stall before they calve.
