Stay at Home Boys.

The Chief Justice in his charge at the opening of the Supreme Court in Prince County addressed to the Grand Jury some remarks which should be well weighed by intending emigrants. He referred to the great beauty and fertility of the country through which he had passed on his way to the Court, and to the early prospect of a splendid crop. Then he called attention to the fact that we have been a peculiarly fortunate people. Neither famine, nor pestilence, nor terrific storms, nor terrible calamities of any kind have troubled us. Our career as a Province has been one of quiet, steady progress. We have labor saving machines of various kinds to relieve the farmer, and many facilities which newer countries lack. Yet, notwithstanding all this, we see young men, inspired by a spirit of unrest and dissatisfaction with their present enviable lot, going abroad to labor in other parts of Canada, in the United States and elsewhere. To His Lordship, this was inexplicable; and he expressed the hope that better counsels would prevail, and that our people would stay at home and strive honestly to improve their circumstances in the favored land of their birth.

These, in brief, though in much less forcible language than he used, were the sentiments expressed by His Lordship on this subject. We endorse every word His Lordship said; and only regret that this part of his charge was not reported in full.

The causes which impel young people to go abroad, are not, however, so inexplicable to THE EXAMINER as to His Lordship.

The Province, though highly favored, is small and could not possibly contain all the genius created in it. Under any state of opinion, some must go abroad. Apart from these, a large number go to larger and more barren countries who would live much more happily and prosperously had they remained and put forth the same exertion in little Prince Edward Island. The causes which impel these latter are mainly, (1) the croaking politicians, and (2) the schools which teach that in politics and the professions are wealth and fame secured, while they are silent about the independence, and ease of mind, and happy old age which are gained by a life of honest healthful labor on the farm.

We sincerely hope that the "croaking politicians" will be silent, and that in future, attention will be given in our public schools to the development of a taste for good farming.

Behind Time.

THE Patriot has at last condescended to make an allusion in its columns to such a vulgar, contemptible and grovelling insect as the potato bug. Hitherto that paper has been inclined to take a very high-minded and exalted stand on this subject, treating it from an elevated point of view, as if fearful that any editorial reference to the scurvy pest would be derogatory to its dignity. It sneered at the possibility, now that the National Policy had wrought such ruin and destruction upon the country, that anything so meek and lowly as the potato bug could manage to scrape up a living on this Island. Consequently all the warnings that THE EXAMINER sounded to have prompt and vigorous measures taken to stamp out the pest, should it perchance again to make its appearance here, and all the information as to the best methods of effecting such a desirable result, were ridiculed and depreciated, by the polished organ of the Grits.

Sensible at last, however, that the bug will, in all likelihood, be the cause of serious damage to the potato crop, and therefore much pecuniary loss to our farming population, notwithstanding the disgrace attaching itself to such a proceeding—that of waging war against an humble bug—the Patriot stoops to sound an alarm, and to repeat exactly what THE EXAMINER has all along been endeavouring to impress upon our people. We fear that the Patriot has cast aside its dignity, when it is too late. Its advice on this subject is somewhat stale and timeworn. The Patriot should stick to those elegant terse, brilliant and unrivalled productions of genius—the speeches of the local Opposition. They have filled up many of its columns in an hour of need, and it is base injustice to throw them overboard now, in order to commence an agitation against the potato bug.

The Dominion Exhibition.

"A letter from a P. E. I. Senator to a N. B. Senator expresses regret that the prize list for cattle is not more extensive, etc. That list has been revised and enlarged, but even if it had not been we should expect to find more public spirit in P. E. I., famous for its cattle and horses, of which the people of the outside world are large purchasers, than to find the people influenced by a few dollars more or less in prizes."

This from the St. John Telegraph. No doubt it is well that the prize list has been revised and enlarged. Indeed, it is somewhat wonderful that St. John—which has a reputation for public spirit—should be content with a Prize List inferior in every respect to that of Montreal, Halifax, or any other city in Canada, where a Dominion Exhibition has been held. But we must not be too hard on St. John or New Brunswick either. Like other Cities and Provinces,

they have occasionally to suffer a loss of reputation because their mean men are at the head of their public affairs. The public spirit of the other Provinces of Canada is, we submit, not so particularly concerned in the success of the St. John Exhibition as that of New Brunswick, and especially St. John. If the prizes are not sufficiently large to attract competition, does the fact show a lack of public spirit on the part of Nova Scotia, or P. E. Island, or Quebec, or Ontario? And as the Prize List shows that there is little hope or possibility of winning enough money even to pay expenses, may not persons in these Provinces decline to run the risk of transporting valuable animals hundreds or thousands of miles without showing a want of public spirit?

The insinuation of the Telegraph that the people of this Province are in this respect wanting in public spirit, is hardly consistent with the fact that, in 1880, they sent to Provincial Exhibition at St. John a rather large exhibit of live stock, though no prizes were open to exhibitors outside of New Brunswick. But the Dominion and Centennial Exhibition being supported by a grant of \$10,000 from the General Government, we submit that we have some right to complain if the prize list is framed to suit New Brunswick only.

Business at Summerside.

The Pioneer says merchants inform us that business so far this spring has been fully up to the average. The farmers did not last fall take in as much money as they generally do, still the lack was very materially supplemented by the quantity of produce, as well as the large number of cattle and horses, shipped since opening of navigation. Last Saturday people were along in considerable numbers and we believe most of the storekeepers had as much as they could do in the way of selling goods. We believe Summerside is going to have a pretty brisk trade for the next few weeks. With the large amount of money paid for produce and cattle we cannot understand how it can be otherwise.

An Ottawa dispatch to the Halifax Herald says:—"The dearth of news has caused a special quantity of imaginary scandals to be unearthed by grit reporters and editors. One of the most recent and also most absurd is a statement that Sir Alex. Campbell was on the eve of departure for British Columbia by special train, and would be accompanied by Mr. Schreiber and several other officials and also by a retinue of servants. The facts are that Mr. Schreiber intends leaving shortly on his tour of inspection in connection with the British Columbia section of the Pacific Railway. He will be accompanied by his secretary, Mr. Jones, and will go to San Francisco in his official car, the transport of which will cost the government nothing. As Sir Alex. Campbell also intends visiting the Pacific Province this summer on departmental business, he has been invited by Mr. Schreiber to accompany him, and I believe the invitation has been accepted. It will thus be seen that the arrangement reported as gross extravagance is really one which will effect a saving to the government and stands in marked contrast to the manner of travelling by officials during the MacKenzie, Bridges regime."

—The official statement of the Government for the eleven months, ending May 31, 1883, shows that the receipts were \$32,330,103; and the expenditure, \$24,109,926; leaving a surplus of \$8,220,177. This is considerably beyond Sir Leonard Tilley's estimate.

Mrs. Langtry.

A correspondent writes:—"In the evening we went to see Mrs. Langtry. I consider her remarkably beautiful. Her manner is quiet, easy and distinguished. Nothing staidy whatever about her. She moves with grace and does not appear to be aware of it. She is very handsome. Her head and neck are perfection. Her face is not extraordinary in repose, but when it is lighted up by a smile, she is perfectly lovely. Her profile surpasses anything I ever saw. No sculpture, painting or engraving that I remember approaches it. Still her face is not intellectual, there is a sparkle in the eye, but it is that of fun, not of genius. Neither is there passion in her face or eye. She must always fail in passages that delineate the working of passion. That delineates the working of passion. She is not a "Minerva" nor a "Venus," nor a "Juno." One can scarcely classify her except by saying that she appears the laughing loving goddess without passion. Her impersonation of Miss Hardecastle, in "She Stoops to Conquer," was exceedingly good, so natural and unaffected throughout. She was, by far, the best actor of the party; you could see that the others were acting, but she appeared to be Miss Hardecastle, and spoke with perfect grace and artlessness, which indicates high skill in histrionic art. Her voice is sweet and clear, like a silver bell of considerable compass and under good command."

CURRENT NOTES.

The spurious nuptials between the bogus Lord Cantyre and his victim have been annulled.

Prince Bismarck threatens not only to dissolve the Reichstag, but to abolish it, at all events in its present form.

The cultivation of sugar cane is being carried on to a considerable extent in the vicinity of Essex Centre, and a sugar factory is now about to be erected.

The Canadian lacrosse team now in England played the United Kingdom at Kensington Oval on the 11th, and defeated their opponents twelve games to one.

Who will not say that the world does not move! After a score or more of rejections the House of Lords has last passed the bill legalizing marriage with a deceased wife's sister!

A sensational story telegraphed from Washington to the effect that Her Majesty was on the point of abdicating is positively denied by the British Consul-General at New York.

A large monument of grey granite is to be placed by the Queen over the grave of John Brown, in the kirkyard of Crathie. A cairn is to be erected to his memory somewhere near Balmoral.

Stimulated by Queensland's energetic action in annexing New Guinea, the other Australian colonies are urging the Imperial Government to annex the New Hebrides and other island groups in the Pacific.

An ominous indication of the state of public security in St. Petersburg is contained in the notice by the police limiting the illuminations at St. Petersburg upon the return of the Czar and Czarina to two hours.

Messrs. Parnell and Davitt have come to an understanding in regard to the matter in which the Irish agitation shall in future be carried on. Instead of going to America Mr. Davitt will remain at home and "run the machine."

The Bank of France employs 160 female clerks, who receive 60 cents a day to begin with, and after a year or two an annual salary of \$360. They sit in rooms apart from the men, are superintended by officials of their own sex, and their work is of the best quality.

Now that the Czar has got back to St. Petersburg, we hear no more about his driving about without an escort. At the time of his entry into the capital he was at once driven at a rapid trot to the palace. Russian loyalty seems to have fizzled out now that the beer is all gone.

Great discontent is said to exist in the farming districts of Limerick, and large forces of police are kept busy protecting boycotted persons, and watching premises from which the tenants have been evicted. Large tracts of land are reported to be running to waste for want of care and cultivation.

An extremely sensational report comes by way of Washington to the effect that the condition of the Queen's health is so serious that Her Majesty's abdication is hinted at. The despatch in which this highly improbable rumor is announced is such a farrago of spiritualistic and pseudo-medical absurdities that it bears its contradiction on its face.

United States Minister Hunt and Admiral Baldwin have received from the Czar a large gold medal, commemorative of the coronation. Admiral Baldwin also received a gold snuff-box, with a portrait of the Czar set in; brilliant, to mark the Czar's personal appreciation of the courtesy of the United States in sending a special naval mission.

The four figures required to complete the O'Connell monument in Dublin, have been placed in position. They are of colossal proportions, in bronze, and represent angels in sitting positions, the wings measuring about eight feet. One has an Irish wolf-dog attending on her; another holds in her hand a hatchet enclosed in a bundle of fuses, representative of old Roman law; the third has on her knees an open book, and the fourth carries a sword.

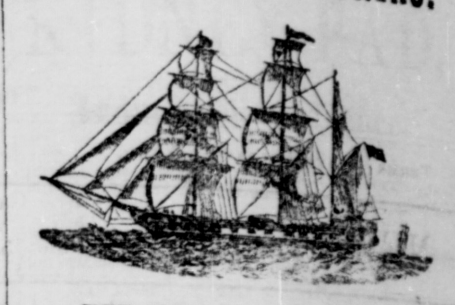

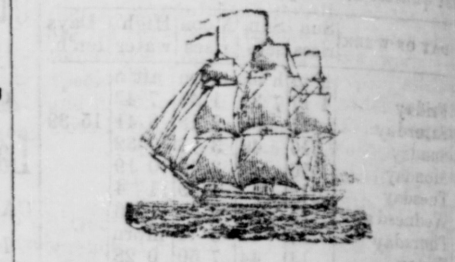
