## Montague Yacht 1st To Finish But Places Second In Results

The Merry Mac II, skippered by her owner Fred Fraser of Moncton was the winner on corrected time of the Northumberland Strait Yacht Race. The race, which started Friday evening from the Charlottetown Yacht Club, was a long and uneventful voyage for the 16 boats entered. Extremely light winds and the heavy tides in the Northumberland Strait made the going so slow that half of the boats either gave up and put in to port or resorted to power to get them to Shediac, and so were listed DNF (did not finish). The first boat across the line was Thrumcap, owned by Dr. L. A. Johnston of Montague. Thrumcap completed the 65-mile trip up the Strait in about 23½ hours, giving her a second on corrected time. As first boat over the line she was the winner of the Col. Victor Oland Trophy and the Irwin Printing Trophy for the first Island boat to finish.

## Price Bros. Ltd. Earnings Decline

QUEBEC (CP) — Price Brothers and Co. Limited announced today that net earnings for the six months ended June 3 were \$3,857,000 compared with \$4,259,000 for the same period of 1964. Net earnings per share were \$1.19, against \$1.32 in the 1964 period. The company said in a statement that earnings reflected a material reduction in shipping profits due to the United States dock strike in the early months of 1965 but that the present sales outlook is good and capacity operations are forecast for the remainder of 1965. The statement added: "Newsprint sales were approximately the same as in 1964 and mining income was \$339,000 lower due to reduced shipments. However, it is expected that mine production for the full year will be equivalent to that of 1964. Operations at the Newfoundland mill were hampered early in the year by a power shortage due to river ice problems and the power supply was again interrupted later by flood conditions."

Basso Jan Rubes, veteran of Canadian opera, took on a new role last night at Confederation Centre theatre. His title might be "singer of folksongs" banned in Czechoslovakia. But the songs were in Czech or Slovakian—and they've been escaping censors' shears ever since they were first introduced on Rubes' CBC radio show, "Songs of My People."

Most people in last night's large audience couldn't have cared less about the lyrics of Jan Rubes' songs. Their only concern lay in hearing that glorious, powerful voice, and if applause would do it, they would have been hearing it long after the scheduled end of the concert had passed.

Rubes, is perhaps best known for his work in opera—the medium through which his great range and control show to best advantage.

**ALL FOLK MUSIC**  
But last night, it was folk music all the way through a sort of live "Songs of My People."

Jan Rubes, folk singer, may not make such an impact on his audience as Jan Rubes, opera singer, but there were a couple of selections on the program which gave his audience a glimpse of his operatic prowess, the more notable being the German "In Cielis Cuius" in a pleasant, informal performance.

## Ottawa Ranks Top Attraction For Tourists

OTTAWA — Canada's capital continues to rank as the nation's number one tourist attraction.

To the end of July this year some 375,000 people have toured the centre block of the parliament buildings. This is an increase of about 20,000 over the same period a year ago. In July alone, 125,000 visitors from all parts of Canada and the United States made parliament hill one of their vacation sight-seeing highlights.

The biggest single day was recorded during the May holiday weekend which also coincides with Ottawa's famed tulip festival. A total of 15,300 toured the building that day.

Officials say the changing of the guard ceremony which attracts 5,000 or more tourists each day in July and August has been mainly responsible for the steady increase in recent years. But there are also more organized tours, chiefly of school children, throughout the 12 months.

## Ford Earnings Show Decline In Six Months

TORONTO (CP)—Ford Motor Co. of Canada Ltd. had earnings of \$14,700,000 or \$3.86 a share in the six months ended June 30, down from \$15,600,000 of \$4.2 a share in the same period last year, the company reports.

The decrease came despite record first-half sales of \$507,000,000. Sales in the same 1964 period totalled \$437,000,000.

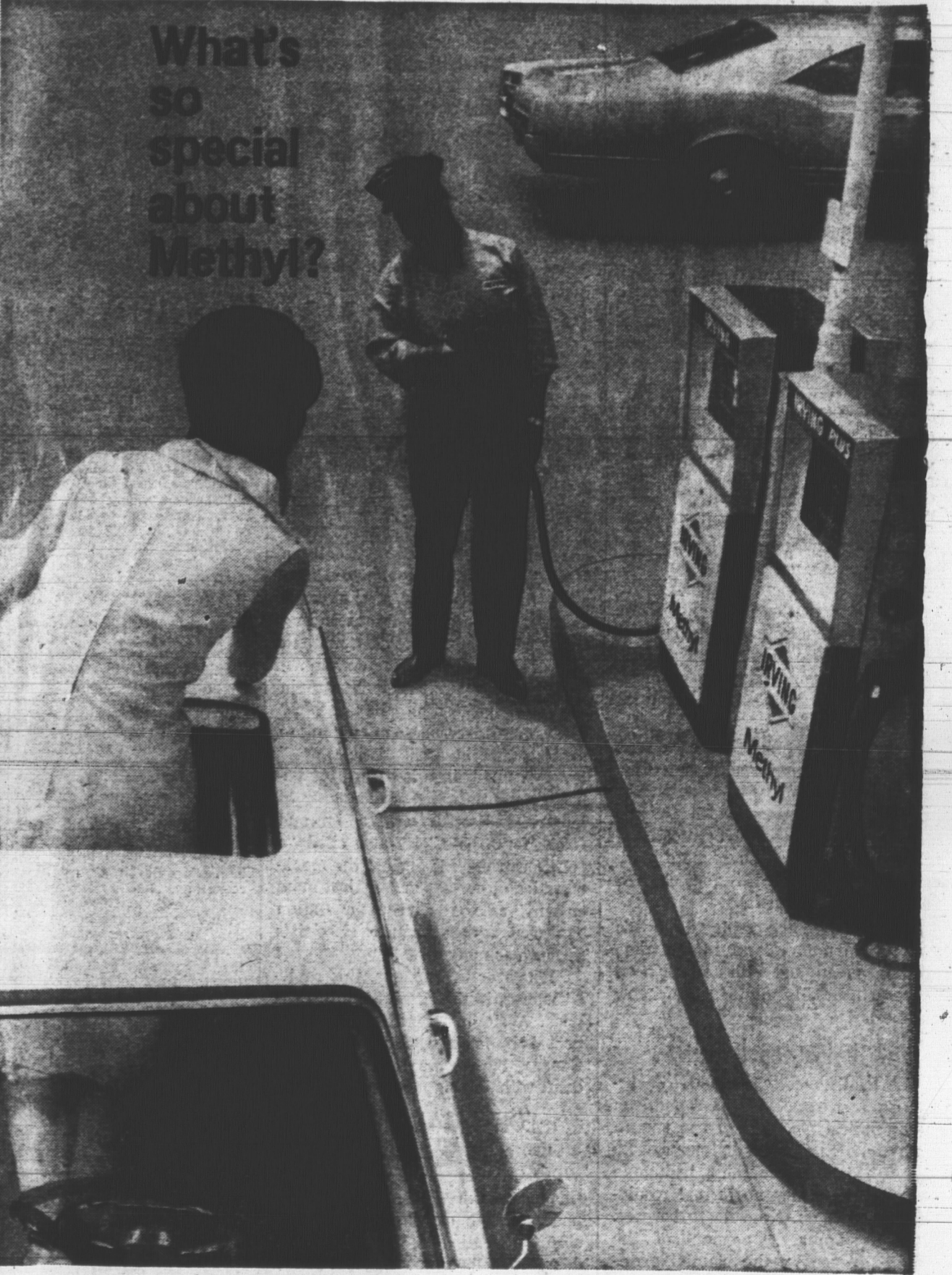
