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Two Drivers Draw \$100 Fines, Remanded For Impairment

But South proceeded to make the contract despite the 5-1 trump bid. He took the ace of hearts, played the king and another spade and finished the nine when West followed low.

With the finesse succeed in a spade, declarer realized he could not make the contract if the spades were divided 3-2, since he would be unable to discard both club losers in time if this were the case.

Once West had shown up with a trump trick, South knew he could make the contract only if West had four spades, and he therefore played on the assumption that this was the actual distribution. He realized that if West had one, two or three spades, there was no hope of making the slam, and he consequently played for the only possibility that gave him a chance.

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Island Fishermen Complete Course The three-week navigation course for fishermen which has just concluded at the Vocational Institute, Charlottetown, saw 22 students successful in obtaining their certificates. Members of the group were examined by senior Marit time examiner of masters and mates E.D. Mackay of St. John's, Halifax, and were awarded the Canada Department of Transport Certificate as temporary master of a power boat less than 40 gross tonnage.

A number of other students completing the course were not examined as they were unable to meet the right eye-sight standard required of all applicants for Department of Transport certification.

Instructor-in-charge, Captain J. Palmer, attributed the success of the current navigation courses to the keenness and enthusiasm of the students working in pleasant and spacious surroundings, with access to a complete range of modern up-to-date navigational aids.

In addition to the visual training aids available was conceived and implemented by Vocational Institute principal, Floyd Buel and Captain Palmer. It is a large magnetic display capable of simulating any simple or complex shipping traffic situation which might occur at sea.

The effect achieved is that a vessel at a distance of approximately 10 miles can be seen bringing considerable realism into the classroom.
