The colorful basket containing fresh purple grapes, blueberries, raspberries, large carrots, tomatoes and lettuce, which did full justice to island grown produce, was presented by Miss Ruth Wood, one of the active members of the Alexandria Vegetable Garden Club.

Miss Mary Robin, supervisor of Women's Institute and Mrs. Maylea Manning, assistant supervisor for Prince Edward Island, were also present, and commented on the value of salads in the diet.

Mr. W. E. Shaw, Deputy Minister of Agriculture, who is also the Director of the Canadian Horticultural Council which is sponsoring this feature, pointed out that Salad Week - from Aug. 1st to 9th - was designed to focus people's attention on the fact that Canadians do not eat enough fresh fruits and vegetables.
