ANOTHER REPLY TO STOCKMAN

SIR,—An open letter by Stockman, in
THE EXAMINER of the 19th inst., may in my
opinion be classed with others along the
same line which were published last winter
in our city papers, Dr. McLeod being the
target. But this time it is the Local
Government, the Minister of Agriculture
and the Government Inspector that come
in for about an equal share of abuse.
Ignorance and prejudice "spring eternal"
in the human mind, and as soon as one
conflict is settled the war breaks out afresh
in some other field. Scientific discovery
or reform of any kind has invariably been
met with protests and cries of indignation
from the strongholds of fanaticism. In-
dulgence in abusive language, however, is
after all, a quite harmless occupation for
the class of persons who enjoy that sort of
pastime.

As you are aware Sir, the Dominion
Government has appointed an inspector of
stock for this province, with the view of
detecting and stamping out tuberculosis
from among our cattle. So far about
five hundred official tests have been made,
and sixteen animals found diseased. It
must be borne in mind, however, that
these herds were tested because the disease
was evident by clinical symptoms, and by
no means indicates in any way what pro-
portion of cattle are affected on the Island.
Yet it clearly points to the necessity for
active measures being still further prose-
cuted in the effort to rid our herds of this
plague. But it is not sufficient to destroy
our diseased stock. We must have some
means by which we can keep diseased
stock from being imported. You cannot
stop a stream by damming it up. Stop the
source and the stream will dry up. So it
is with tuberculosis and other contagious
diseases among stock. Destroy the
disease at home and
keep outside diseased stock from coming in
and our herds will soon be free from con-
tagious disease. When people understand
that quarantine means protection to life
and property, they will demand that none
but healthy animals enter the province.
To this end an act has been passed at the
last session of our local legislature which,
if enforced, will be of great benefit to the
Island as a whole. Men as unreasonable as
"Stockmen," who who seems to care
little whether our stock is healthy or dis-
eased, tell us that this kind of legislation
will ruin their business. But ask
the farmers and dairymen who take pride
in their profession and who are interested
in the growth and development of our
beautiful Island and I think you will find
them almost to a man interested in this
subject, and not only willing, but anxious
to do everything possible to stamp out this
disease and thereby give protection to our
people and property. But there is another
side to the question that touches every
farmer. We must have an increasing
and steady market for our products. The
English market has been mainly supplied
by the dairy interests of Northern Europe,
where tuberculosis exists to a much greater
extent than here. Now it is an acknowledged
fact that butter made from tuberculosis
milk will contain the bacilli. This being the
case, as long as we export butter contain-
ing these germs we cannot expect to excel
in the markets of the world. But stamp
out tuberculosis in the island and then
stamp on every case of butter and cheese
that we ship "Guaranteed free from
pathogenic germs." Make the letters "P.
E. I." upon every box, stand for "purity,"
and the demand will be so great that the
dairy interests of the province will be
doubled.

Stockman would try to arouse politi-
cal prejudice and refers to the recent de-
bate on this question in the Dominion
parliament. Should he read Hansard
he will find on page 6305, June 30th,
1899, that Sir Charles Tupper urges the
Minister of Agriculture to act with a firm-
er hand in dealing with tuberculosis, and
suggests that more public money be voted
for dealing with this disease
with a view of eradicating it from
our herds. All other Conservative
members who spoke on the question, in-
cluding Messrs Sproule, McMillan, Ed-
wards and Clancy, urged advance along
this line some advocating compulsory
testing. Mr. Fisher however was opposed to
compulsory testing as yet, but thinks
that public opinion will demand it later on.

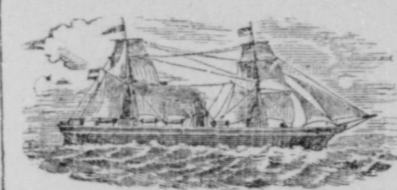
