MOVE INTO FOURTH

Primroses Defeat Saints 8-4 In Island Loop Play

Bobby Dowling's Montague Primroses, desperately battling for that fourth and last playoff spot in the Island Senior Hockey League, trimmed St. Dunstan's University 8-4 at the Sports Arena last night.

The victory moved the Primroses into sole possession of fourth place as Saints slid into the cellar. The win also gave the Primroses a fighting chance to make the playoffs.

Coach Dowling led the way for his Primroses rapping home four goals—three in the first period—and helping to set up another. Big Flick Landry beat Earl Shepherd twice while defenceman Merle Longaphie and Harley MacLean hit for singles.

Saints' goal were divided evenly between Jean Lemay, Miner MacDonald, Gerald Murphy and Ray Gionet. Referees Leith Jay and Don Whelan handed out 11 penalties. Montague were given 7 of them, including a misconduct to Joe Coyle in the first period.

Saints lacked the dash and fire that has been the chief characteristic of the college squad in league play. Primroses outskated and outplayed them all the way and were richly deserving of their victory.

Montague ran up a 4-0 lead in the first period and increased it to 5-0 in the second period before J.E. Morrison (S) 2 1 that but the Primroses got that one back and took a 6-2 lead out of the second. The two teams split four goals in the finale.
