

**IN MEMORIAM**

**MALCOLM A. BEATON**

Many friends and relatives were saddened when it was learned that one of the oldest and most respected residents of Peters Road, in the person of Malcolm A. Beaton had suddenly passed away on the evening of August 3, at the age of 88 years.

Deceased was the son of the late Alexander and Christine (Stewart) Beaton of Flat River, P.E.I., where he was born and spent the earlier part of his life. He received his early education at Flat River School, later attending Prince of Wales College and Charlottetown Business College and for many years followed his favorite profession of school teaching.

He was well and favourably known and made friends with both young and old who enjoyed his ready wit and cheerful personality. He will be missed by his many friends but especially by his family as the welfare of his family was always his first concern. He was a member of the Peters Road Presbyterian Church and served as a member of the Session for many years.

He leaves to mourn his passing, a devoted widow, (the Winifred Johnston), also two sons and three daughters, at home: Vernon and Elsie (Mrs. G. Elms) of Watertown, Mass.; Helen, (Mrs. C. Toonrey) of Atlanta Ga., and Anne, (Mrs. E. C. Code) of Charlottetown. A son, Forrest, predeceased him several years ago.

The funeral service which was held in the Presbyterian Church was largely attended and was conducted by the pastor, Rev. Carl Currie, who spoke words of comfort to the bereaved, taking for his text Luke 2:20, "Lord, now lettest thou thy servant depart in peace, according to thy word." Hymns sung were: "The Lord's My Shepherd" and "By Cool Silloom's Shady Rill," favourites of the deceased. A solo, "I want to Go There, Don't You?" sung by Mr. Willard MacLean, also a trio, "My Jesus I Love Thee" by Rev. C. Currie, Messrs. Walter Campbell and Pierce Butler were both beautifully rendered.

Many beautiful floral tributes and messages of sympathy bore silent testimony of the love and esteem in which the departed was held.

Interment took place in the Peters Road Cemetery. Pallbearers were: Messrs. Reginald Johnston, Allan Cameron, Gerald Johnston, John Gillis, Harry Johnston and Marvyn Johnston.

Thus the pioneers pass away and we who are left must step forward to take our places for a brief time in their ranks. May others leave behind such a fitting heritage as the one whose biography is here so feebly rendered.
