

Local and Other Items.

Russia will station a fleet in the White Sea.

The crops throughout Russia are unusually good.

The widow of a man killed while unloading a steamer at Montreal sues the vessel for \$5,000.

The court for hearing appeals from City Assessment was to-day further adjourned until Monday next.

No French mails now come to Canada direct. All are funigated by the British and American Authorities.

MAJOR-GENERAL MIDDLETON has arrived in Ottawa. He says General Luard is not hurt on account of leaving Canada so hurriedly.

A MAN named Beagan, of New Haven, dropped dead last evening while going to his tea table. We have not heard the cause of his death.

REMEMBER the Strawberry Festival and Promenade Concert, in the Drill Shed, this evening. It will be well worth attending. The admission is only ten cents.

DR. HOBKIRK, Superintendent of Quarantine at this port, has received orders to quarantine all vessels arriving from Toulon and Marseilles, in France, and from London, in England.

By cable to Capt. Wm. Richards we learn that the bark Arctic, Sequel and Olivette, owned by him, arrived in the United Kingdom. The Olivette made the passage in eighteen days from Malpeque.

WILLIAM DODD respectfully calls the attention of parties in want of very desirable building lots to the sale on Monday next, 21st inst., at 12 o'clock, of the DesBrisay property postponed on account of the weather from last Monday. (July 17, 21)

A CORRESPONDENT residing in California, and writing on the 26th June, says there has not been such heavy and continued rains for about fifty years, and that the crops in some sections have suffered greatly—the grain growing in the straw.

ENGLAND has again justified the supremacy for the savagery and severity of her sentences by the condemnation of five persons to an aggregate of thirty-five years' penal servitude for stealing two ducks, four bullocks, seven fowls, one apron, and three small pieces of jewelry.

MR. GEORGE STEWART, jr., editor of the Quebec Chronicle, who was commissioned to write the articles on New Brunswick and Nova Scotia for the Encyclopedia Britannica has, we learn, been also requested to prepare the article for the same work on the Province of Quebec.

PARTIES in the west portion of Texas confirm the report that the sheep and cattle industries in that part of the state are threatened with annihilation by drought. Sheep men are arriving daily at Eagle Pass, seeking ingress to Mexico water holes. The streams on the American side of the Rio Grande River are dried up.

MR. L. B. MILLER, principal of the Charlotte Business College, has gone on a trip to the United States. He expects to be absent about a month, during which time the college here will be closed. Mr. Miller intends visiting the principal business colleges during his sojourn in the States. We wish him a pleasant time.

The condition of the cotton trade at present, says a Montreal despatch, continues to cause much uneasiness in business circles. A gentleman sent to England has just returned to Montreal, and it is understood he finds it impossible to ship cotton to that country excepting at such a sacrifice as would be near ruin to the shippers.

MR. A. L. BROWN, of the firm of W. & A. Brown & Co., left by train this morning for England, via Rimouski, to purchase a large fall and winter stock of Dry Goods for the business, which will be continued on in DesBrisay's building, until 1st April next, or till the completion of the new brick store, on the old site, opposite the Market House.

As already advertised, the friends of Pownal and vicinity are making arrangements to have a grand Tea on the 23rd inst. We hope the friends in the city will avail themselves of this opportunity of having a day's real enjoyment. We understand the committee are determined to satisfy the most fastidious; and the proceeds are for laudable object.

A SAD JOKE.—At Coburg, Ont., on Saturday last as Lena Baswell was washing clothes she was approached by Minnie Stillwell, who took up a bottle lying on the window, and telling her that she would anoint her with "holy water," proceeded to pour the liquid on the young girl's head. The victim commenced to scream, and soon all the mill was in an uproar, and the liquor was found to be vitriol. The side of the young girl's face as well as her neck and arms are seriously burned. She will be marked for life.

FOREIGN markets have changed but slightly since our last report. Potatoes in the Boston market are neglected, and old stock now sell at from 60 to 65 cents. Eggs in that market are running up, and all that are placed on the market are rapidly taken at from 16 to 17 cents per dozen wholesale. In Montreal cheese sell for 8 1/2 and 9 1/2 cents wholesale, and in Charlottetown at 10 cents. The flour market is steady, and will remain the same as at present, until the fresh stock comes in. Then, as the wheat crop is good, prices will, no doubt, be much lower.

THE Moncton fire department, as reorganized, held its first annual celebration on Tuesday, which was very successful. Moncton is in possession of the best equipped fire department of any town of similar size and population in the Dominion, all the apparatus being of the most modern kind and kept in excellent order. The department consists of about sixty men, under the command of George Ackman, chief engineer, one of the most energetic and capable of officers, who thoroughly understands his duties and takes the deepest interest in them.

MRS. HUSE, of Manchester, N. H., the invalid lady rescued from the wreck of the steamer State of Maine, arrived here last evening, accompanied by her son, Mr. J. W. Huse, and servant. They are staying at the Osborne. When Mrs. Huse was taken ashore from the State of Maine it was feared she would not recover from the shock she received; but she has borne up wonderfully and seems much better than when she left her Island home. She intends to remain on the Island during the summer, and will take lodgings at some quiet farm house. Her son speaks very highly of the courtesy with which he and his mother were treated by Captain Pike, of the ill-fated steamer.

Local and Other Items.

The death rate from Canadian cholera is assuming large proportions in Montreal.

As a precaution against cholera, the thickly populated tenement districts of New York are being disinfected.

Two summonses have been issued against parties for breaking the Scott Act. This makes four cases in progress.

The steamer M. A. Starr sailed for Halifax last night with a freight of 1,500 cases of lobsters and other produce.

The Rev. Mr. Burwash will preach in St. James' Church in the morning and Rev. Dr. Jenkins in the evening, Sabbath first.

A NOVEL sight was witnessed on Pownal and Kent Streets to-day, the moving of a schooner from a ship yard on Lower Spring Park Road to the river at Douse's shore.

The schooner Minnie E., Capt. Noel, is receiving freight at Southport for St. John's, Newfoundland. She will also take passengers and will sail on Tuesday next.

A YOUNG widow, in erecting a monument to the "dear departed," cleverly availed herself of the opportunity to inscribe upon the tomb, "Sacred to the memory of Mathusien Bezuchet, who departed this life aged sixty-eight years, regretting the necessity of parting from the most charming and best of women."

A FALSE report was circulated to-day regarding the fate of one of the prisoners in Queen's Co. Jail. It was stated that Terrence McAtee, Jr., while cleaning the jail pump, fell into the well and was drowned. The deputy sheriff, on hearing the report, as in duty bound, made an official inquiry, and discovered that the story was deliberately concocted for the purpose of putting sheriffs and reporters to the trouble and inconvenience of calling on Mr. Harvie.

A SMALL CLOUD.—A recent cable despatch announces that the Government of India is collecting material at Quetta, for an advance on a large scale on Candahar. It is further stated that a hitch has arisen in the negotiations for the appointment of an Anglo-Russian commission for the delineation of the Afghan frontier. Russia desires to stipulate that the commission has no power to survey beyond certain lines. This would seem to indicate that Great Britain anticipates a "difficulty" with Russia in the Far East. Has the race between England and Russia for Herat really begun?

"THE STATE OF MAINE."—Capt. Chisholm and Mr. John A. Roddock returned from the wreck of the steamer last evening. The Captain says that the top works are washing away a little, but that the hull is good and is not twisted in the least. He thinks that she can be got off. If she does come off she will be towed to St. John for repairs. Mr. Roddock is confident that she can be taken off, and has inside the company an offer to do the job. Capt. Towler, of the Boston Wrecking Company, proceeded to the wreck this morning, and will make an immediate report to the Company's head quarters.—Globe, 19th.

CALEDONIA CLUB.—This National Society have lately rented one of the elegant and spacious rooms in "McEachern's building," corner of Queen and King Streets, which they are now getting furnished in first-class style. They are to hold their Annual Scottish Gathering on the grounds of the Hon. John Longworth, Charlottetown, on the 31st inst., and as they have obtained very low fares from the Railway and Steamboat Companies, no doubt, their games will be as usual, well patronized by the public. The day will be patronized by a public holiday, by order of His Honor the Lieutenant-Governor, and His Worship the Mayor.

D. L. DOWD, of Springfield, Mass., the strongest man in the world, having a record of lifting 1,442 pounds, has been attending a performance by Lulu Hurst, the Georgia phenomenon, who has been setting New York in a furore by her remarkable feats. She had been holding chairs, canes and billiard cues by the hands, displaying so much force that the men were unable to do the articles. It was claimed that she possessed some mysterious power which enabled her to perform the feats, but Mr. Dowd found that she was only possessed of remarkable muscular strength. He was able to move any article that she held with difficulty, and was so successful that Miss Hurst's manager declined to allow him a further trial.
