MONTREAL (CP) - External Affairs Minister Paul Martin expressed concern Monday over the fact the United Nations has been "powerless" to intervene in the Viet Nam conflict.
He told the Montreal Canadian Club the situation raises a question whether the UN will be allowed to go the way of its predecessor, the League of Nations.
"Twenty years after the First World War the League of Nations...founded on the rock of collective security," he said. "Are we going to allow, can we afford to allow, the United Nations to share the fate of its predecessor?"
Mr. Martin said the Viet Nam conflict—"one of the most serious crises we have faced since the end of the Second World War"—is the type of situation in which "we would be right to expect" the UN to intervene.
Instead, it is powerless to act, partly because of its own financial crisis and partly because some of the disputants in Viet Nam "refuse to accept its credentials."
"It (the UN) has been compelled to stand by in impotence while the situation deteriorated. It has been incapable of taking the action it should be taking to reverse the course of events in Viet Nam, to bring the parties to the negotiating table, to prepare the ground for a peaceful and honorable accommodation."
The external affairs minister called for a new approach to the UN which would build on the past, but also "open up new perspectives for the future."
He said, in his view, this new approach should rest on nine basic principles:
1. Restoration of UN solvency and steps to avoid "at all costs a recurrence of the present situation."
2. Action to ensure that the world organization has "an assured and effective capacity" for future peace-keeping operations.
3. Action on the basis of "the broadest possible consensus" within the UN membership, especially in regard to peace-keeping.
4. A change in attitude to ensure that social and economic problems, on which the newer members place primary emphasis, is given equal weight with peace and security.

5. More recognition by the older members of the philosophy of the newer nations, which look on the UN as "an instrument of peaceful change" and not merely an organ for stability.
6. Recognition that the UN cannot be "the property or preserve of any single nation or group of nations."
7. New efforts to narrow international divisions both within and outside of the world organization.
8. Assurance that "we keep the goal of universal membership firmly before us."
9. Recognition of the principle of shared responsibility as the basis for all UN activity.
"Those, as I see it, are the elements of a new approach to the United Nations," he said. A text of Mr. Martin's speech was made available to the press in advance of delivery.
