

Sees Maritimes Ripe For Big Beef Cattle Industry

MONCTON. — From Albert County in New Brunswick and Cumberland in Nova Scotia, two carloads of beef cattle are scheduled to reach Unionville, Ont., this weekend in CNR shipments which hold promise of opening up a big agricultural industry in the Maritime Provinces.

Actively interested in fostering such an industry, and firmly convinced of its ultimate success, is the nation-wide firm of Massey-Harris-Ferguson Limited. Purchased through Moncton offices of the company, one carload of cattle was shipped directly from Moncton and another from Amherst.

C. O. Crawford, Moncton branch manager of the firm implement company, said in an interview he firmly believes that beef cattle raising in the Maritimes can become an industry of major proportions. At present the cattle population in the three provinces is not large.

"We have the rich grasslands here and there is no reason why, over the years, beef cattle raising couldn't be developed extensively," he said.

Mr. Crawford said that while there are some who are opposed to the idea of shipping feeder cattle from the Maritimes, on the ground that the cattle population is too small, there are others keenly enthusiastic about it. He added that generally speaking the farmers are all for it.

This summer Massey-Harris-Ferguson made a survey of the stock available. It was found that the beef cattle population in the Maritimes is small, but can be built up over a number of years. There is a good market in central Canada, Mr. Crawford said, where buyers are prepared to pay top prices.

He added: "There is no doubt about it. Beef cattle raising can become big business in the Maritimes. The long-term market exists in central Canada, the Maritimes have the rich grasslands, and all that is needed is the willingness to go ahead."

The charge was dismissed when the Conway man told the court he couldn't remember being assaulted, but stated he had a sore ear, neck and cracked ribs.

However, the accused will be charged with the illegal sale of orange extract but was not asked to plead due to an amendment to be made in the body of the charge.

The case was adjourned to October 23rd.

A resident of Kelvin was fined \$10 and costs of \$4.00 for driving a motor vehicle without due care and attention. The charge arose from an accident on the Allen Road during the summer. Magistrate R.S. Hinton, Q.C., presided.

Prepare New Street For Apartments

SUMMERSIDE — Construction of four or five apartment buildings housing about 23 units was reported ready for commencement at the new hillcrest housing development in Summerside following a meeting Monday evening of

representatives of Hillcrest Housing Limited, Central Housing and Mortgage Company, and members of the town council.

Town department officials were preparing Tuesday to start work of constructing the new street, together with water and sewage facilities, for the development where the first buildings that will be constructed will contain four to eight apartments, however, it is understood that following the construction of the first four or five buildings, future construction on the site will be one and two unit rental houses.

It is expected that the new housing units will be rented primarily to RCAF personnel whose numbers at the Summerside Station are expected to be doubled with the conversion of Argus aircraft to this station, and the replacement of the Maritime Training Squadron by an operational squadron at the Summerside air base.
