Ellerslie Wharf Tenders, Conway Firm Is Lowest
 Tenders have been opened preparatory to awarding the contract for the construction of a new wharf at the Ellerslie Biological Station and it was found that the firm of Dawson and Noye of Conway submitted the lowest tender of \$17,895.
 This information was revealed over the weekend by Mr. J. Watson MacNaught, M.P., Parliamentary Assistant to the Minister of Fisheries, who arrived in Summerside Thursday evening for a short stay.
 In the past it has been necessary to build a temporary wharf each spring and take it up in the fall. Construction will begin as soon as the weather permits and materials are assembled. It is expected the contract will be awarded to the Conway firm this week. S

MacNaught Is Urging Surveys Of Causeway Feasibility
 J. Watson MacNaught is continuing to urge preliminary investigations by Ottawa in regard to the proposed Northumberland Strait causeway.
 Mr. MacNaught left Summerside at noon yesterday for Ottawa. He had been accompanied on his brief visit by Mrs. MacNaught.
 Observing that a causeway would be of inestimable value to this Province, he nevertheless warned that there might be difficulties. The Department of Fisheries, of whose Minister he is Parliamentary Assistant, has made investigations which seem to indicate that there will be no harmful effect on any species of fish and definitely not to some. A more exhaustive investigation must still be made.
 The very first thing that should be done, he said, was to find out if fill is available near the site and in such quantities as to make the project economically feasible.
 The Department of Transport has laid down a new ferry, the Lord Selkirk, for the Wood Islands-Carleton Place run and Mr. MacNaught suggested that if the causeway project does not prove feasible, though he hopes that it will, efforts should be made to persuade the powers that be to provide an additional ferry for the Borden-Tormentine service.
