

LEGISLATIVE ASSEMBLY

(Continued from 3rd page.)

SATURDAY, April 24.

House met at 11. Mr. Robertson asked the Commissioner of Public Works if a petition had been received from the inhabitants of Kingsborough, Lot 47, asking for the construction of a bridge across the West River, East Point, and if so what action did the Government intend taking with regard to it. He also asked the Commissioner if a petition had been received from the inhabitants of North Lake, Lot 47, asking for the opening of a new road from the main post road to McLon's Cove and if so what action the Government intended taking in the matter. Hon. Mr. Peters stated that petitions had been received in both cases and would be considered by the Government. Mr. Robertson asked the Leader of the Government if a petition had been received from the inhabitants of East Point asking for telephone extension from Souris to East Point and if so what action the Government intended taking in the matter. Hon. Mr. Peters stated that at the time of telephone extension in some parts of the Province it was understood that the Dominion Government was to extend the line to East Point lighthouse. Now the Local Government will use their influence with the Dominion Government for this long-promised extension and will render assistance in the project. The House then resumed a committee of supply. On the item for roads Mr. Blanchard strongly advocated the extension of the Duxar Road, in his district. The discussion was continued by Mr. Shaw, Mr. Farquharson and Mr. McLaughlin, the former asserting that road bills due last year were carried over into this year's accounts. The item passed. When the item for wharves came up, Mr. Shaw pointed out that many of these structures were badly in need of repair, and showed that the late Government spent much more in this branch of the public service than was expended by their predecessors. This item and several others passed, and the Chairman reported 38 resolutions agreed to in committee. The report of the committee was adopted. The resolutions were referred to a special committee to prepare a bill in accordance therewith. Hon. Mr. Peters said the committee would be ready to report on Monday. Hon. Mr. McLellan presented the supervisors' returns. On motion of Mr. McKinnon the House went into committee on the act respecting surety and guarantee companies, with Mr. A. Peters in the chair. Reported agreed to and set down for third reading on Monday. House adjourned until Monday afternoon at three o'clock.
