TELEGRAPHIC NEWS.

Lord Dufferin Going to Cairo—Baker Pasha's Programme.

LONDON, Oct. 30. Lord Dufferin, British Ambassador at Constantinople, will go immediately to Cairo to conduct negotiations for the settlement of the Egyptian Question. The Egyptian Ministry has accepted the programme of Baker Pasha for the reorganization of the Egyptian Army.

El Medhi to be Crushed.

CAIRO, Oct. 30. The Egyptian Ministry held a meeting to-day and discussed the situation in Upper Egypt and the march of the False Prophet, El Medhi on this city. The Ministry decided to send an army of twenty thousand men to Khartoum to oppose the aggressor and, if possible, crush out the rebellion.

Help for the Egyptian Army.

LONDON, Oct. 30. The Egyptian Government has applied to the Government of Great Britain for officers to command the expedition against the Soudan False Prophet, El Medhi.

Reign of Terror in France—Socialists at Work—Floods, &c.

PARIS, Oct. 31. A desperate riot and Socialist demonstration has taken place at Lille. A reign of terror prevails. Socialist proclamations have been posted throughout this city, urging violence and hostility to the Government institutions. Railway and steamboat traffic at Marseilles and Cannes has been stopped by serious inundations. Prince Napoleon is now engaged in the preparation of a fresh political manifesto.

The "Jersey Lily" Meets Disappointment in Flames.

NEW YORK, Oct. 31. Abbey's Park, one of the most magnificent theatres in this city, was totally consumed by fire yesterday. This causes great disappointment to theatre goers as Mrs. Langtry, the London Beauty was to appear last night in Tom Taylor's comedy, the Unequal Match.

Cuban Refugees.

LONDON, Oct. 31. The British Government strongly condemns the surrender of Cuban refugees to the Spanish authorities by the Gibraltar police.

Floated—Fatal Fire on a Train.

LONDON, Oct. 31. The Steamer "Preston," which went ashore at Berwick a few weeks ago, has floated off. She sustained slight injuries. Last night, a Pullman Sleeping Car, attached to a train running from this city to Glasgow, took fire from the stove. The passengers were immediately alarmed, and an unsuccessful attempt was made to extinguish the flames. One passenger, sleeping in a central berth, who did not hear the alarm given by the porter, was burned to death.

The Crofters Difficulty.

EDINBURGH, Oct. 31. A wealthy resident of the Highlands has offered to pay the arrears of rent due by the Crofters on the Isle of Skye. Therefore the sending of a military force to execute writs of ejectment will be averted.

Union of Two Irish Parties.

DUBLIN, Oct. 30. A proposition has been made by the leaders to unite the Home Rulers and National Leaguers. It is thought the proposal will be agreed to.

GENERAL CABLE NEWS.

PARIS, Oct. 29. At a meeting of the Topom Topographical Society, to-day, DeLesseps delivered an address in which he approved of the scheme for creating an internal sea in Africa, and supported a peaceful conquest of the Congo district by M. DeBrazza. Amid the applause of the assembly he presented DeBrazza with the gold medal of the Society. VIENNA, Oct. 29. The bridge on Willbad Gastein road has been swept away. The cemetery at Brunck has been flooded, graves laid open and coffins carried away. The town of Lienz is completely inundated. The rivers Po, Adige, Tattamento and Brenta have overflowed their banks and inundated the country. TEXEL, Oct. 27. The steamer Gulf of Panama, from Japan for Bremen, has stranded off Zuiderhaaks. Part of the crew was saved; 22 persons were drowned. BERNE, Oct. 29. The village of Grindehuld, 35 miles southeast of this city, has been almost entirely destroyed by a hurricane. PARIS, Oct. 29. Prince Murat and M. Jacques Abattucci have fought a duel. Prince Murat was wounded in the fore-arm. LONDON, Oct. 28. A despatch from Dublin says three hundred people on Tory Island are without food and that other portions of the population in Western Ireland are threatened with starvation. CHESTER, Pa., Oct. 28. The extensive works of the Eureka Cast Steel Company, at Lamokin, were burned this morning. A large number of valuable patterns were destroyed; loss, \$150,000. DUBLIN, Oct. 28. Lady Florence Dixie has published a pamphlet in which she seeks to prove that there is a large discrepancy and balance unaccounted for in the totals of the Land League funds. She alleges the "victim

of this great modern swindle" to raise a protesting voice and loudly demand where the money has gone. She calls upon all true Irishmen in Ireland and America to unite to give their country glory, prosperity and greatness, and no longer to assist in dragging her down to the chaos of degradation and ruin. She urges Irishmen to drive from their midst self-seeking adventurers and upstarts. LONDON, Oct. 28. Heavy rains have caused floods in the Thames valley, especially at Oxford, Windsor, and Egham. The waters continue to rise. Charing Cross boat pier house was carried away but recovered. Houses adjacent to Thames street are flooded. SILVERTON, CO., Oct. 28. Yesterday the bodies of Homer Stewart and Jas. Sullivan were found terribly mangled in the tunnel of Lancaster mine. It is thought they were killed by a premature blast. MARGATE, ENG., Oct. 28. A destructive fire is raging here. The Assembly Rooms, Royal Hotel, Vicarage, and the whole South side of Cecil Square have been burned. The flames are spreading rapidly despite the efforts to suppress them. LATER.—The fire has been quenched. Loss estimated at £60,000. LONDON, Oct. 28. It is believed that the Foreign Office has received information that the Porte is making great efforts to have trial of Arabi abandoned. A Tifis newspaper states an encounter took place between Chief Obeidullatis and Turkish troops. The latter, it is reported, lost 2,000 men. It is said that there will be a lively time along the line of the Halifax and Cape Breton Railway and Coal Co. on Saturday next, that being the day upon which the Nova Scotia Government takes charge of the road preparatory to handing it over to the Syndicate. It is expected that the company will offer resistance to the Government, and the number of employes along the road has been largely reinforced with that intention, it is said. ROBERT R. GARVIN, who, in a quarrel in Winnipeg, killed Archibald McDonald, a Nova Scotian, by shooting him through the heart, is to be tried immediately for murder. The coroner's jury returned a verdict of "wilful murder." The tragedy arose out of a quarrel in which McDonald, under provocation struck Garvin, who is a locomotive engineer, and halls from the United States. PERSONAL.—The St. John Telegraph of the 29th says: "Dr. Tucker, of Sydney, New South Wales, is in the city. He came to the continent with the idea of visiting the various asylums for the insane, and to-day goes to Fairville to visit the New Brunswick institution.
