## SERIOUS EVENTS IN CRETE

### Wholesale Murder of Christian Families.

#### THE BOMBARDMENT OF CANDIA CONTINUED.

#### Troops From Foreign Ships assist the British Garrison.

ATHENS, Sept. 8.—The bombardment was renewed at Candia yesterday, and that port was seriously damaged.

The foreign warships have landed sailors to re-enforce the British garrison, and pumps have been landed to assist in quenching fires.

According to telegrams from Candia it is estimated that 22 British were killed and 45 wounded yesterday. Several Christian families have sought refuge on the warships. Many corpses are lying in the streets of Candia.

In one case a whole family were killed. The Italian Consulate is also reported burned.

A Russian warship left Birius hurriedly for Crete, carrying the Russian consul.

LONDON, Sept. 8.—The correspondent of The Times at Candia telegraphing on Wednesday fully confirms earlier reports of the most serious events there.

He says:—Lieut Haldane was killed and Lieut Seagrave was wounded. The soldiers pluckily carried Lieut Haldane's body to the boat under a hail of bullets.

The telegraph office was repeatedly on fire and the father of the telegraph superintendent was killed.

The worst is feared, as to the fate of the majority of the Christians.

It is reported that only 250 have been saved out of over 1000.

The situation was extremely difficult. The Turkish troops refused to aid the British, who being exceedingly few in the town were soon overpowered.

## STORMY SESSION SPANISH SENATE.

### Spanish Officers Learn the Truth.

#### COUNT D'ALMENAS SPEAKS PLAINLY TO THEM.

General Weyler Blames the Government's War Policy.

MADRID, Sept. 8.—The Chamber has followed the Senate in discussing the late war behind closed doors.

This action has caused the greatest sensation.

The Senate session was a stormy one. General Weyler reminded the Senate of how Count D'Almenas had greeted the returning soldiers, ignoring the officers.

He declared that this was a reflection upon the officers' efficiency.

The mistakes made in Cuba are not to be blamed upon the army, he said, but upon the Patrician at the head of the government.

Count D'Almenas replying to Weyler's strictures said: I addressed my greetings to those who have been martyrs for their country, and to the Spanish. I did not address the Generals for they showed themselves incapable of leading the soldiers to battle, or of showing them how to fall worthily on the field.

Marshal Primo de Rivera shouted "that it is not true," and General Weyler and others joined in the protest.

Count D'Almenas addressing General Rivera replied: "I am not afraid of such cries of the epaulets or of decoration that will have to be torn off the breasts of several officers. The sashes of some generals should be torn off and put around their necks.

A great uproar ensued.

#### G. T. R. GETS STEAM-BOAT CONTRACT.

MONTREAL, Sept. 8.—The Grand Trunk has made a contract with the England line to run a service during the winter months to Portland in place of the Dominion Line.

#### WILL RAISE \$1,000,000.

The Canadian Methodists Have Decided to do this.

TORONTO, Sept. 5.—Among the matters to be discussed during the Methodist conference now in session here is the scheme, proposed by Rev. Dr. Potts, to raise a twentieth century fund of one million dollars for the strengthening of the church departments and the propagation of missions in those remote sections of the earth where the Gospel has not been heard. The scheme originated with the Methodists in England, who, under the leadership of Mr. Perks, M. P., a leading Methodist layman, are committed to raise a fund one million guineas before the opening of the new century. Mr. Perks says that English Methodism would have been immeasurably stronger if she had not neglected London's great masses. His proposal is to redeem the past as far as possible by devoting a large share of the million guineas to pushing the work of the church among the neglected people of the great metropolis. Rev. Dr. Potts heard of the proposal of Mr. Perks, caught some of his enthusiasm and at once asked Canadian Methodism to emulate the example of the mother church and raise one million dollars. His spirit had been communicated to all the annual conferences, who had sent it on to this body with hearty endorsement. Dr. Potts says that the Methodists of Canada can and will raise the sum asked, and if any man in Canada knows of the capabilities of the Methodist Church in this regard, Mr. Potts does.

## ASSASSINATION IN RUSSIA.

### Plot Against the Czar's Life.

#### A House Exploded, two Persons Killed, Many Wounded.

The Conspirator's Body Found in the Debris.

MOSCOW, Sept. 8.—A daring plot to assassinate the Czar of Russia was almost successful. The plan of the conspirators was to allow gas to escape into a house on the route of Czar's procession until every room was saturated. One of their number was to remain in the house and strike a light when the Czar was passing, in the expectation that the house would be blown to pieces and the Czar killed by the flying debris. The conspirator would perish himself as a sacrifice to the cause. The lot fell to Alexander Kolonoff. In his agitation, Kolonoff mistimed the explosion. When it occurred a staff officer and his wife were passing and were killed. Thirty others were injured. Kolonoff's mangled body was found among the ruins.

It is presumed this was done in accordance with the demand which it was rumored that the British Minister here, Sir Claude MacDorald, was instructed to make on account of the alleged partiality of the great Chinaman to Russia.

#### Chicago Hog Market.

UNION STOCK YARDS, Sept. 6.—The estimated receipts of hogs were 18,000; the official report of yesterday was 24,752, of which 5,554 were shipped and 4,683 left over; estimated to-morrow, 26,000. Best goods firm, others steady. The quotations to-day were:—Light sized, \$3.60 to \$3.95; mixed packing \$3.55 to \$4.00; heavy shipping, \$3.50 to \$4.00; rough grades, \$4.50 to \$4.65.

#### CHICAGO HOG MARKET.

UNION STOCK YARDS, Sept. 6.—The estimated receipts of hogs was 25,000; the official report of Saturday was 12,482, of which 2,345 were shipped and 2,964 left over; estimated to-morrow, 17,000. Market fairly active, 5c lower than Saturday opening. The quotations yesterday were: Light mixed, \$3.60 to \$3.97; mixed packing, \$3.55 to \$4; heavy shipping, \$3.50 to \$4; rough grades, \$3.50 to \$3.65. The receipts of cattle were 17,000, including 700 western. Market steady to weaker.

#### Approaching Bye-Elections.

WINNIPEG, Sept. 7.—Hon Clifford Sifton, minister of the interior, has arrived from Rat Portage, accompanied by James Sutherland, M. P. Liberal whip, and A. P. Collier his private secretary. Touching upon the date of the approaching bye-elections, the Liberal whip said that at present there were six vacancies in the house of commons, and it was the intention to bring all these elections off on the same date at a convenient time for the farmers. The date had not yet been fixed, but it would be about the time the heavy fall work on the farms was completed.

#### MR. GLADSTONE WILL.

He left an Estate Valued at Nearly \$300,000.

LONDON September 7.—The will of the late Right Hon. William E. Gladstone has been probated. It shows that his personal estate is valued at £53,500.

Mr. Gladstone's will was written by himself in an ordinary memorandum book. It is a document of about two thousand words, and is a remarkable specimen of penmanship. The second clause of the will has reference to the funeral arrangements, and says:—

"Commending myself to the infinite mercies of God in the incarnate Son as my only and sufficient hope, I leave the particulars of my burial to my executors, specifying only that they be very simple and private, unless there be conclusive reasons to the contrary. And I desire to be buried where my wife may also lie. On no account shall a laudatory inscription be placed over me."

After appointing his sons as executors, the will charges the future possessor of Hawarden to remember that, as the head of the family, it will be his duty to extend good offices to other members thereof according to his ability and their manifest needs and merits. The rest of the document leaves souvenirs to servants and bequeaths to his grandson, William, as heirlooms, all patents of crown offices held by the testator and books and prints presented to him by the Queen, letters from the Queen, etc.

The will bears date of November 26th, 1896.
