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Sherwood Still Hopeful Gov't May Want Site

A committee of Sherwood Village Commissioners expects to finalize plans today on steps to promote its proposed location for the new provincial building. It was learned following a meeting of the village commissioners last night. The commissioners met to discuss problems connected with the site they have proposed, and it was reported yesterday that the government has been asked to indicate as quickly as possible its interest, or lack of interest, in the Sherwood site. One of the commissioners said yesterday, "We still think it's the best site, and we are going to continue to do everything possible to encourage the location in Sherwood". He added that a great deal of work and study have gone into the project so far. It is reported that others are anxious to make use of the site for residential building if the government is not interested. Provincial Secretary J. David Stewart has been notified of the problem, and has assured the commissioners that his committee will reach a decision on the Sherwood site within the next few days.

At last night's meeting Laurie Coles, engineering consultant, discussed with the commission the problems of the proposed sewer and water installations. Such matters were dealt with as cost and the size of the area it would be financially possible to serve. 'Emergent Africa' Discussed By Panel At UN Ass'n Meet

A panel discussion on "Emergent Africa" was included in the general meeting of the P.E.I. Branch of the United Nations Association last night. The meeting was presided over by Bruce Hodgins, chairman of the history department of Prince of Wales College and president of the branch. Participating in the two-part panel were Rev. Dr. Francis Bolger, chairman of the history department, St. Dunstan's University; Mr. Hodgins; Lawson Drake, biology department of PWC; Raja Gopal, Queen Charlotte High School; Gerald Wanjohi, Kenyan student at SDU. The panel was chaired by Douglas Boydland of the history department at PWC. During the panel, which consisted of discussion by the panel members alone and of questions from the floor, five major fields were discussed. These included: divisions within Africa, political and racial; international alignments; East Africa, including Kenya, Tanganyika, Uganda and Zanzibar, with the union of these four being discussed; continuing

Temperature Hits 8 Below

Islanders shivered yesterday as temperatures dropped below the zero mark for the first time this winter. At 7 a.m. the mercury dipped to its lowest point of the day when it reached the -3 degree mark. The temperature gradually rose during the day until at 10 o'clock last night it had reached the 11 above mark. At frequent intervals during the early morning hours the wind velocity reached 50 m.p.h. with gusts as high as 60 m.p.h. Late last night winds were recorded by the Meteorological station at the Charlottetown radio range at 35 m.p.h. with gusts to 40 m.p.h.
