The annual report of the Chief Superintendent of Education for the year 1890 has been tabled. It is ably written, full of practical suggestions, and shows that Mr. Nicholson has made himself thoroughly acquainted with our educational system, its defects and requirements, and that he is a painstaking and efficient superintendent.

Public Accounts

Washerwomen on Strike

LONDON, June 16.—At an early hour this morning there was a meeting of laundresses in North London and a speech-making and some waving 300 of the women announced their intention of striking and they did. The laundresses demanded the eight hour day and 42 pence for a day's labor. The demands are considered excessive by the employers. The strikers, enraged at the fact that the laundresses of North London did not join in the strike, marched in a body to the establishments where the "blacklegs" were employed and after smashing the windows of such establishments the striking laundresses invaded the laundries and with many taunts and jeers dragged the blacklegs away from their work, upset or emptied the washbasins, overturned the ironing tables, kicked over the clothes horses and played havoc generally with the mass of clean linen. The police were utterly powerless to prevent the demonstration.

Mackerel are Plenty

GLoucester, June 15.—The best mackerel news received at Gloucester for years came in to-day. A good mackerel year means millions of dollars for the city. It is not strange, then, that the news brought by the schooner Alice M. Jordan will be read with interest. To make good her boast of "good mackerel" she brings 450 barrels of the "riped" fish. They were caught off the Cape shore, and are nearly all No. 2, the best and most salable size. The stock of the fish will be worth between \$6000 and \$7000.
