SPECIAL DESPATCHES TO THE EXAMINER
The Defuncting Clergyman.
KINGSTON, Ont., June 25.
Rev. R. T. Burds, deputy postmaster, has confessed that he is a defaulter to the extent of over three thousand dollars. He is an Anglican clergyman, and for years has been most successful in church work. He is about 52 years of age, a son of the late Justice Burns of Toronto, and has been a post office functionary since 1863. He manipulated the accounts of illiterate farmers and laborers and by making false entries in the Government returns succeeded in swindling poor people whose fears were allayed by his placing in his Savings Bank books the full amount they deposited. When this morning confronted with his crime, he broke down and made a clean breast of the affair. After evidence was heard, the prisoner was committed for trial.

College Celebration

MONCTON, June 25.
The picturesque village of St. Joseph's is in a fête to-day on the occasion of the celebration of the 25th anniversary of the founding of the college. About 200 of the graduates of the institution are expected to participate in the proceedings to-morrow, when addresses will be presented to the Very Rev. Father Lefebvre, Superior of the College, accompanied by a purse of \$3,000 towards the construction of the projected new wing. The closing year is the most prosperous in the history of the institution. Upwards of 180 students are enrolled, and the prospects for the future are excellent.
