THE PRESIDENT OF FRANCE DEAD. Dies Very Suddenly from Heart Disease.

WAS ILL FOR ONLY THREE HOURS BEFORE DEATH.

Had been Engaged in his Usual Daily Occupations.

PARIS, Feb. 17.—Feix Faure, the President of France, died at 10 o'clock last night, after an illness of three hours. It had been known for some time that his heart was weak, but the first intimation that he was sick was given at half-past six last evening when a message was despatched to the Premier M. Dupuy, announcing that the President was ill. Mr. Dupuy immediately repaired to the Elysee. All medical efforts proved futile and the President died of the stroke of ten. Nothing could have given the idea of approaching death till the very last. Mr. Faure indulged in his customary habits of work and even in his equestrian rides. He ate well and slept regularly.

ENGLISH PAPERS ON THE COMMISSION

Say Foster's Appointment was a Mistake

AND DEPRECATE THE POLICY OF THE UNITED STATES.

A late Despatch Announces Foster's Withdrawal from Conference.

LONDON, Feb. 17.—The Chronicle commenting on the possibility of the failure of the Joint High Commission at Washington says: "It had hoped that the reasonableness of the Dominion Government's demands would have been recognized at Washington."
 The Globe says: "President McKinley made a great mistake in appointing Mr. Foster, an ultra-Anglophobist."
 The St. James Gazette says: "We wish friendship with United States, but cannot have it at the price of Canada's interests."
 WASHINGTON, Feb. 17.—Hon Mr. Foster leaves to-day for the south. His withdrawal from the Anglo American Commission has created a sensation. He declines to talk.

OUR NEW SCHOOL BOARD.

SIR.—As the question whether ladies should be appointed members of the School Board or not is now being discussed, would you allow me to make a suggestion or two as to the new bye-laws which, of course, will be passed by the Board in contemplation of the proposed change. I hope I shall be believed when I state that in writing this letter I am only actuated by the honest wish to have the business of our Public Schools carried out in the best possible manner, and by no means desire to imply that ladies are not quite capable of accepting any or all of the offices or positions of trust in our community. Our gracious Queen occupies the highest position of all, and is our chief Magistrate. Why then should not ladies have the lesser dignities, such for instance as seats on the Bench of the Supreme Court and members of the Board of Education? But now for my suggestions:
 First.—This rule should be made and rigidly adhered to. "That more than one person should not be allowed to address the meeting at the same time."
 Second.—That "because" is not to be received as a good and valid reason why any course should be adopted.
 Third.—That the same idea, argument or illustration should not be repeated more than, say, six times in one address or at any one convocation of the Board.
 Fourth.—That should any question arise with regard to the morals of the scholars, the male members of the Board should be allowed to withdraw, and the lady members settle the matter between themselves.
 These are all I can think of just now, except this: Wives of the male members of the Board should not be eligible. It would place too much power in the hands of one family if this were so; and as, of course, the Chairwoman or Presidentess of the council of Women will necessarily be one of the New Board, providing the change be made, I respectfully suggest that Dr. Anderson should resign—Dr. and Mrs. Anderson if allied together at any meeting would be more than a match for all the rest.
