PREVENTION OF CRUELTY.—The Society for the Prevention of Cruelty to Animals have secured the services of Police-Sergeant Cameron as prosecutor. The prosecutor has already entered upon his duties and has issued posters informing the public that every one who wantonly, cruelly, or unnecessarily beats, ill-treats, abuses, overdrives, or tortures any cattle, poultry, dog, domestic animal or bird, or who, while driving any cattle or other animal is, by negligence or ill-usage in the driving thereof, the means whereby any mischief, damage or injury is done by any manner encourages, aids, or assists at the fighting or baiting of any bull, bear, badger, dog, cock, or other kind of animal, whether of domestic or wild nature, shall, on summary conviction before two Justices of the Peace, be liable to a penalty not exceeding fifty dollars, or imprisonment for any term not exceeding three months, with or without hard labor, or to both.

TELEGRAPHIC NEWS. SPECIAL DESPATCHES TO THE EXAMINER. DOMINION PARLIAMENT.

Summary of Proceedings.

OTTAWA, March 3.

After recess,— Sir John Thompson moved the second reading of the Electoral Franchise Act. The Opposition seized the occasion to renew their objections to the machinery and minutiae of the Act.

Mr. Charlton intimated that he would move an amendment to the effect that in all the Provinces where universal suffrage existed the local lists of voters be adopted.

Mr. Mills wanted the Provincial qualifications applied to Dominion elections. Sir John said this was not a proposition to amend the Franchise Law as it now stands and was not an occasion for discussing the general principle of the bill. He knows the strong feeling of the Opposition and assured them that they would have full opportunity to test the question at the next session, so after the recent overwhelming vote of confidence the Government did not see any immediate occasion for appealing to the people. (Cheers.)

Hon. Mr. Laurier said the Opposition had never abandoned the ground that the bill was bad in principle. He moved an amendment to the motion for a second reading of the bill that in the opinion of this House the Electoral Franchise Act ought to be repealed and the Provincial Franchise Act adopted in its stead.

Sir Richard Cartwright supported the amendment and twitted Sir John with being afraid to face the country just now, because of the Jesuits' Bill agitation. The debate was continued by Hon. Peter Mitchell, Mr. Jones (Halifax), Mr. Weldon and Mr. Curran. Just before midnight the House divided on Laurier's amendment, which was rejected—75 to 105. The bill was then read a second time and committed.

Immigrants.—After recess the House took up divorce bills from the Senate.

The Minister of Justice, speaking to the act for the relief of William Gordon Lowery, of Ottawa, said that bills of this kind should not be adjudicated upon by this House without careful scrutiny. He had his own opinion as to allowing such legislation, but so long as it was allowed, it should be exercised with the utmost caution. He showed that the evidence failed to prove adultery on the part of the wife, and that the case was not free from the suspicion of collusion on the part of Lowery and wife. The bill had only passed the Senate by a close vote and he would divide the House on it.

Mr. Jamieson argued in support of the bill.

Weldon, (St. John,) and Mr. Davies supported the Minister of Justice's view.

A division being taken the bill was thrown out, 79 to 80.

The Railway Committee this morning, by an almost unanimous vote, threw out the DeBertram Bill to incorporate the Prince Edward Island and Continental Railway and Ferry Co.

Presbyterian Matters.

TORONTO, April 3. At a meeting of the Toronto Presbytery yesterday, an overture introduced by Rev. J. D. Macdonnell asking some relaxation in the terms of the Presbyterian Church membership was voted down by eight to four, many members refraining from voting.

Rev. W. Frieze gave notice of another overture asking to have sections 3, 4, 6 and 7 third chapter of the Confession of Faith sent down to Presbyteries for consideration on the ground that they "conflict with the views of many most worthy and faithful members and office bearers."

CONVOCACTION DAY. MONTREAL, April 3. At the Convocation of the Presbyterian College held this evening there was a large attendance. All the provinces of the Dominion were represented in the list of graduates. Robert Johnson, B. A., gold medalist, delivered the valedictory. The Northwest scholarship was won by W. T. Moss. A number of honorary degrees were conferred, including Prof. Ross, of Queen's, Kingston, and Rev. A. Macauley, St. John.

Obituary.

In our obituary list to-day is recorded the death of Mr. Joseph Sheidow, of Lot 49, at the advanced age of 91 years. Mr. Sheidow was a native of Ireland, and arrived on this Island about 56 years ago. He taught school for a short time after his arrival, he had the late Mr. John Butler, teacher, of Lot 48, having passed examination and received license to teach at the same time. Mr. Sheidow afterwards settled on a farm where he reared his family and prospered in circumstances. Few men of his time had a better cultivated mind than Mr. Sheidow. Well read, thoughtful, possessed of a large share of native wit, a man of integrity of character, and deeply religious, his long life was a happy and useful one. He was widely known and highly respected. For more than fifty years he was a class leader and local preacher in the Methodist Church, and was a ready and effective public speaker. He was interred at Pownal, the funeral services being conducted by the Revs. George Steel and E. O'Leary. A memorial sermon was subsequently preached by Rev. Mr. Steel.

With the Summerside Journal we regret to learn of the death, on Tuesday last, of Mr. John P. Gillis, an old and greatly respected resident of Miscouche. The deceased was the father of the Rev. D. J. Gillis, St. Columbia, East Point; J. P. Gillis, M. D., M. P. P., Summerside, and V. S. Gillis, land surveyor, Indian River. He was a public spirited citizen, and did much to advance the interests of Miscouche. We tender the bereaved family our sincere sympathy.
