She was suffering from partial paralysis of the lower limbs, and had to be carried from the cars to the church door, from which she managed to drag herself slowly and painfully by the aid of crutches to the shrine. A Valuable Gold Mine.

The gold mine at Gouldville, Memramcook, N. B., is presenting many encouraging features. The company have driven their level 75 feet, cutting the seams. They have crossed several leads, some of them between one and two feet, carrying galena, copper and gold. Assays are being made. One that has been completed shows gold in paying quantities. The ridge of land in which this formation occurs has been taken up by private enterprise, the way from Calhoun's Mills to Dorchester.

Early Paper Money.

A St. John Sun recently noticed an early issue of paper money, bearing date 1776. Mr. F. W. DeYer, of St. Stephen, has a specimen that dates three years farther back. It is a ten shilling note of the province of Pennsylvania, issued in the thirteenth year of the reign of George III, numbered 27,401, and signed by Thomas Leach, Wm. Gillespie (?) and James Stephen. It is roughly printed in red and black, and bears the imprint of Hall & Sellers, Philadelphia, beneath which is the usual warning to counterfeiters is death.

About Insurance Rates.

It is said the tariff fire insurance companies have decided to increase the rate on buildings in unprotected towns and villages to four per cent. The increase will affect the towns of Kingston, Buctouche and Harcourt in this county, and should induce the citizens of these places to take steps to provide fire protection. The cost of an engine and equipments would be more than met by the reduction in insurance rates. The refusal of the companies to take risks in Buctouche has compelled the citizens to act in the matter, and it is understood negotiations have been about completed for the purchase of an engine and appliances from parties in Truro.—Richibucto Review.

California Midwinter International Exposition.

An International Exposition will be held at San Francisco, Cal., U. S. A., from January 1st to June 30th, 1894. The site of this exposition is located in Golden Gate Park and will cover an area of about 100 acres. There will be five principal buildings for the Midwinter Fair, viz: (a) Main structures and Livery; (b) Agricultural and Horticultural Hall; (c) Mechanical Arts; (d) Fine Arts and Decorative Art; (e) Administration Building. Applications are being received daily for separate and special constructions such as State exhibits, restaurants, reproductions, side shows, etc. M. Rev. Frank C. Kelly, son of the late John Kelly, Esq., who was raised to the dignity of the priesthood at Nicolet, Quebec, on Thursday, is expected here this evening, and will preach in St. Dunstan's Cathedral at the ten o'clock service tomorrow. Father Kelly was ordained for the diocese of Detroit, Mich. Rev. Cornelia Campbell, another Islander, who was ordained at Home about nine months ago, is also expected here this evening on a brief visit. Father Campbell is a Doctor of Divinity and a Doctor of Philosophy. He was ordained for the diocese of Halifax. By the death of his uncle, Duke Ernest II, the Duke of Edinburgh, the Queen's second son, has become reigning Duke of Saxe-Coburg and Gotha and a German prince. The territory over which he reigns has an area of 755 miles and a population of 206,213. The late duke had a very large private fortune, most of which will now go to his successor. The income of the reigning duke on the civil list is 100,000 marks, equal to about \$25,000, besides a part of the surplus revenue of the Gotha domains. The duke has an annuity of \$125,000 from the British government. His elevation will leave a vacancy in the list of admirals in active service.
