

The Bishop of Manchester and Ecceitism.

Speaking a few nights ago at Manchester at the annual meeting of the Church of England Temperance Society, and explaining why he was not at total abstinence, the Bishop of Manchester said that many years ago he signed a conditional pledge. He went on very well until towards the close of the second year, and then he broke down utterly. His doctor told him he would either have to give up half his work or take some light stimulants with his principal meals. It was ridiculous to talk of giving up half his work, and therefore he tried the stimulants, and he never had the symptoms again. He supposed he was one of those who had not the power of easily digesting great masses of food, and could not engage in active mental labour without nervous excitement. Thousands of men doing the greater part of the intellectual work of England belonged to the same class, and it would be monstrous for these men either to commit suicide or give up half their work because they were bound not to take the stimulants. He observed a rigid rule never to drink alcoholic liquor except at meal times, never to take "nips" or refreshers between meals. If all however, who need stimulants would adopt the Bishop of Manchester's rule it would be well for the world.

The Parson's Share.

In the parish of Llandrillo, in Colwyn Bay, there is a large fish-weir which the sea enters at high tide; and at the ebb the fish are left in the weir, which are closed by stakes. The rector has a right to a weir, and an arrangement has long existed by which he sends his gardener every tenth day to gather in all the fish that may have been left by the tide. Last week the "parson's tide" happened to come on a Sunday which it rarely does, and there has usually been a special arrangement on this point. The devout people of the neighborhood professed to be greatly scandalized because the reverend pastor sent his man to take what the sea had cast up for his tithe, but his "Sabbath desecration" was approved by Providence as there was an exceptionally large haul.

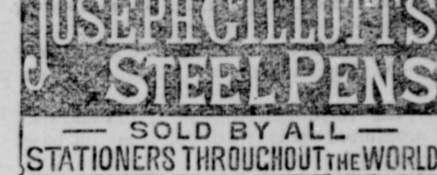

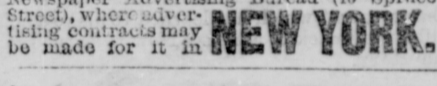
