Worst Highway Conditions Experienced In Many Years

It is a good many years since travelling conditions on the main highway connecting Summerside with Borden and Summerside with Kensington and Charlottetown have been as primitive as they are today. Reports from people living along the rebuilt stretch of road between New Annan and Kensington last evening showed that night travel is non-existent and that motor vehicles are getting through in the daytime only with the help of tractors.
The North Bedque section is reported to be nearly as bad. Both these sections of the highway were badly broken up by frost last spring and later the road was torn up and re-built but not paved. For about a mile outside Kensington the road follows a new route entirely and this part is very soft.

Milk Prices In Kensington And S'side Advance

Beginning the 4th of March, residents of Summerside and Kensington will pay 16 cents per quart for milk. This announcement has been made by the P.E.I. Milk Control Board. At present, residents of that area are paying 15 cents per quart.
In the new order pasteurized and raw milk will each be sold for the same price, continuing the present practice.
In Charlottetown pasteurized milk sells for 16 cents a quart while raw milk is one cent less.
Producers in the Summerside and Kensington areas will get \$1.04 per lb. butter fat when the new prices go into effect. At present they are receiving 95 cents per lb. butter fat. The price to the producers in the Charlottetown area is \$1.04 per lb.
