THE barn and other outbuildings, with their contents, belonging to Mr. James McQuaid (John's son), of Baldwin's Road, was burned to ashes on Sunday last. The accident is reported to have occurred by small children using matches carelessly while Mr. and Mrs. McQuaid were at divine service at Cardigan Chapel.

DURING the gale on the night of the 17th ult. a barn belonging to Mr. John Pineau of North Rustico, was blown down, killing three horses and seriously, if not fatally, injuring two or three cows. This is a heavy loss and we trust Mr. Pineau's friends and neighbours will manifest their sympathy by promptly replacing it.

A GOOD number of passengers left by the special train for Georgetown at 9 o'clock this morning.

On Friday and Saturday last 1,200 barrels of oysters left Summerside for Quebec and Montreal.

A LARGE number of illegal salmon nets have been seized on the Miramichi by the fishery officers.

PARTIAL Dominion revenue returns for September show considerable increase over the same month of 1881.

INDICATIONS of the existence of oil at Gladstone, Man., has led to the formation of a company to operate the field.

FROM \$16 to \$20 is the rate of wages offered by operators for men to work in the N. B. woods this winter, which is just about the same figures as prevailed last fall.

THE United States bonds withdrawn from securities of National banks by the United States Treasury Thursday, and surrendered to the Secretary of the Treasury for exchange into three per cents amounted to \$730,450. Total to date, \$179,738,800.

WORK on the new well outside the Railway Engine House, is being actively pushed forward. A steady stream is flowing into it, and the "Rollo" fire engine is engaged pumping out the water in order to allow the workmen to dig the well deeper.

A LETTER from the English Chief Rabbi states that many Jewish refugees on their return to Russia met with violent deaths, whilst those who succeeded in reaching their old homes in safety are subjected to almost intolerable restrictions and annoyances.

THE values of the imports of merchandise into the United States during the twelve months ending August 31, 1882, were \$741,983,917, and for the corresponding period of the preceding year, \$643,248,555. The value of exports of domestic and merchandise from the United States during the twelve months ending August 31, 1882, were \$732,038,772, and for the twelve months ended August 31, 1881, \$594,717,454.

THE Sun says that the Canning Factory at Souris, P. E. I., is doing a large business in canning beef, mutton, lamb, etc., the market being principally in Britain. The steamer "Beaver," from Port Hood, C. B., landed a full load of cattle at Souris on Saturday, for the use of the factory. There are similar establishments at Port Hood which use up about 25 cattle and 100 to 150 sheep and lambs, per day.

THE Montreal Gazette (Sept 28) says:— "There is a complete glut of cattle in this market, under which prices have given way all round. Mr. James McShane, Jr., M. P. P., has bought over 250 head of shipping cattle during the past few days, at from 4 1/2 to 5 1/2 c per lb.; a few choice at 3 1/2 c. Sheep sold at 5c to 5 1/2 c per lb. Vigor market was overcrowded with cattle to-day, good butchers' stock selling at 4c to 4 1/2 c per lb., and common at 3c to 3 1/2 c. About 1,500 sheep and lambs were offered, the former selling at \$4.50 to \$7.50 each, and the latter \$2 to \$4 each, as to size and quality. Sales of good hogs were made to-day at \$7.75 to \$8.00 per 100 lbs.

Temperance Act Convictions.

October 4th before Alexander Hayden and Peter Macgowan, Esquires, two of Her Majesty's Justices of the Peace, for Queen's County, Susan Murphy, of Southport, widow, for violation of the Temperance Act, 1878, fined \$50 and costs, being the first offence, and in default of payment forthwith, to be imprisoned for the space of two calendar months in the common jail of the County.

Also before the same, James Murnaghan, of Southport, Lot 48, was convicted for a like offence, and adjudged to pay a penalty of \$100 and costs, and in default of payment forthwith, to be imprisoned in the common jail for three months, being a second offence of the same nature.

Thomas B. Hall, of County Line, in Queen's County, charged for violation of said Act, was postponed until the 19th October, inst., and Warrants were ordered for the arrest of three witnesses who failed to attend and give evidence in the case.
