## TB Seal Giving Shows Increase

The fourth interim report of the 1965 Christmas Seal Campaign issued recently, reveals that on a national basis, compared with the same period last year, contributions have increased \$143,052.

According to the report contributions in Prince Edward Island as of Jan. 11 are up \$345, making a total of \$12,840 with six weeks remaining until the close of the campaign.

Blanche Conway, seal sale secretary of the P.E.I. Tuberculosis League, in expressing satisfaction for the response this year, stated that "there are times when sending out 'reminder' letters is rather an embarrassing chore, but this method so dictated by the Canadian Tuberculosis Association has certainly been very rewarding and people in general have been most understanding."

Miss Conway stated that the increased interest in the 1965 Seal Sale could be attributed to the concentrated health, education publicity given during the campaign coupled with the involvement of well over 400 voluntary workers in tuberculin testing and x-ray surveys throughout the province last year and to the accelerated use

of the Christmas Seal mobile x-ray unit in surveying vulnerable groups of adults.

The public is reminded that contributions to the 1965 Christmas Seal campaign are receivable till the closing date, February 28.

## Legion Appoints Zone Chairman

GEORGETOWN — Francis Shephard was appointed zone centennial fund campaign chairman for the Legion Centennial Fund Campaign at a meeting of the southern Kings zone of the Royal Canadian Legion held in Georgetown Jan. 27.

In this campaign the Royal Canadian Legion across Canada will endeavour to raise a total of \$1,000,000 to be invested and used as a fund by its administrators for scholarships. The fund will be established as a centennial year project.

Mr. Shephard will look into ways and means of raising money for this fund in co-operation with the other three Legion branches of southern Kings County. These branches include Montague, Cardigan and Georgetown.

It was decided at the meeting that a \$25 prize be given to the most deserving pupil from the zone who is attending Montague Regional High School up to and including grade 10.

This prize is to be awarded at the discretion of the principal for the school year ending June 1966.

when the storm came up Sunday, but police could not confirm this. Snowmobiles churned through five-foot drifts in an effort to get to the anglers, many of whom had run out of firewood. Police said visibility on the lake Monday was not more than 60 feet.

At least one death was attributed to the storm in Ontario. Gerald Wilcox, 59, a teacher at Merrittton High School, collapsed and died after walking about 500 feet in heavy snow near his home at Queenston.

Heavy snowfalls and drifting snow blocked roads, closed schools and disrupted traffic across eastern Ontario. Brockville, Belleville and Kingston all reported 12 to 14 inches of new snow and drifts on highways five to six feet deep. There were few accidents, but dozens of cars were abandoned.

## Krebiozen Developer Acquitted

CHICAGO (AP) — The U.S. government's effort to prove fraud and conspiracy in promotion of krebiozen collapsed Monday when a jury rejected its acquittal verdicts for the final two defendants.

Dr. Stevan Durovic, developer of the drug used by some cancer patients and the Krebiozen Research Foundation he heads were found not guilty. The seven women and five men jurors had listened to nine months of testimony and deliberated 47 hours 50 minutes in reaching the final verdict.

The jury Saturday freed Dr. Andrew C. Ivy, 72, physiologist who was chief medical backer of the drug; Marko Durovic, 65, lawyer and brother of the doctor acquitted Monday, and Dr. William F. P. Phillips, a general practitioner who prescribed krebiozen for some cancer sufferers.

Estimates of the cost of the trial, longest federal criminal trial in the Chicago area's history, ranged from \$450,000 to as high as \$3,000,000.

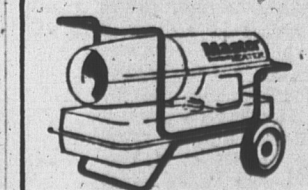
## WILL PRESENT PAINTING

Against granting appeal were Mr. Justice André Taschereau and Fernand Choquette.

Mr. Hebert, 38, is a publisher as well as an author. Mr. Justice Tremblay said in his appeals judgment that the power of the courts to punish contempt should be exercised only with extreme prudence and only in cases where action is made urgently necessary by the need for courts to fulfill their function.

"In the case now before us, it's not only that the Coffin trial has been over for several years but the three Crown prosecutors involved in that trial have not occupied that office for 50 years," the appeals justice said. "I don't see how the charges made against them could handicap a court in the exercise of its duties."

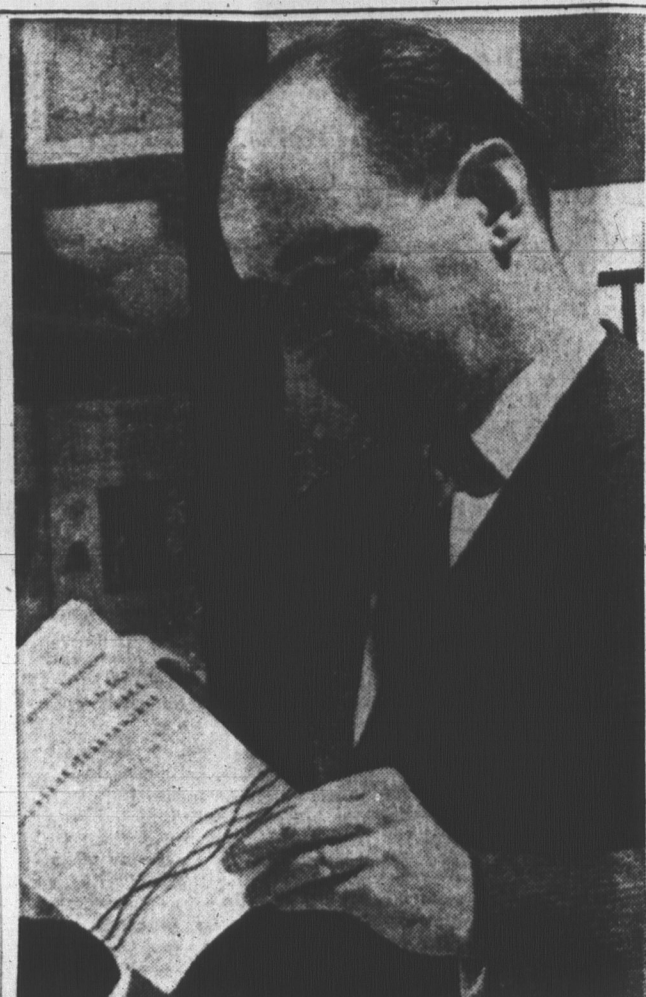
