ADDRESSES W. K. S. PUPILS. — Mr. C.F. Florida Test Most Gratifying Says Mr. Peppin

The almost complete freedom from virus disease shown by Island seed potatoes in the Florida tests should result in additional orders for many thousands of dollars according to Mr. S.G. Peppin, technical adviser to the P.E.I. Potato Board, who arrived home this week after supervising the tests.

Mr. Peppin left for Florida in January and it was on the 20th of that month that the first examination of the plots where the Island potatoes were planted was made. At that time the different varieties were showing excellent progress with the exception of the Cobbler, Cans and Nettle Gema.

The final readings on the Island plots were attended by buyers and growers from many parts of the United States and all were in agreement on the excellence of the local product. Several of the seed potato buyers, however, suggested that the bags used in shipping potatoes from here were not strong enough to stand the wear and tear of long distance travel. They recommended a heavier type bag.

Mr. Peppin believes that Island growers should continue to participate in the Florida test each year as it provides an excellent opportunity for acquainting potential buyers of seed with the quality product which is produced in this Province.

Coun. Johnstone On Education And Municipal Affairs

The following address was given in a broadcast last evening by City Councillor Edwin C. Johnstone, chairman of the Finance Committee.

"Ladies and gentlemen: "As one of your City Councillors I have been asked to participate on the program for Education Week by giving a talk on the subject, "Education and Civic Life." "Government today is big business, probably the biggest business in the world. It demands, at the municipal level as well as at the provincial and national levels, the interest and cooperation of all our citizens.

"Since the kind of education offered by our schools and colleges will determine both the attitudes and the abilities of our future citizens, it is most important that all patriotic adults, not just parents, should take a keen interest in this important subject.

"As already mentioned, civic business has become so great in recent years that not only mayors and councillors but citizens in general should have an interest in it. And in order to do so they must have a reasonable amount of education.

"As the years go by the services and operations of the City become more expensive and more and more complicated.

"In order to administer successfully the affairs of the municipality it is necessary that all civic officials and employees have a real interest in their work. It is equally necessary that they have adequate education to enable them to cope with the many difficult problems which arise.

"I would like, therefore, to enumerate some of the tasks which confront the civic authorities in the administration of their duties. There are the problems connected with the City's finances. This is a matter of debentures, the providing of adequate sinking funds, the determining of the best methods for collection of taxes; the involved matters of assessment and tax rates, etc., etc.

In other departments there are the ever present problems of supplying water and sewerage services to a growing community; the purchase, maintenance and operation of expensive fire and street equipment; the problems arising from the ever increasing volume of traffic, etc.

"These and many other complex and intricate phases of government confront the Mayor and Council at all times.

"Surely they are matters which demand that the civic administrators have more than just an elementary knowledge of the three R's. Ability to investigate and comprehend the more abstruse phases of government is infinitely more important than a willingness to render petty services to property holders within the Ward. At the same time it is necessary that the public be sufficiently educated to comprehend the problems faced by its elected representatives and to assess the policies adopted by the civic authorities for the solution of these problems.

"Education is therefore of paramount importance in civic life and I feel that the national organizations promoting "Education Week," are to be congratulated for their foresight and interest in setting aside one week each year for special study of our educational system. By so doing they bring these matters before the people and give them an opportunity to keep abreast of developments in the entire field of education."

ing carried on... we realize that if these negotiations fail, or if an armistice is successfully concluded and then a further aggression is committed by the Communists, a new and dangerous situation will arise...

"We are not convinced... that general retaliatory measures such as the blocading of the Chinese coast would be as effective in ending the war in Korea as they would be likely to extend it to China.

"We also think that U.N. policies should be designed to end an aggression in North Korea and not to overthrow by force a Communist regime in Peking. Like other Democratic governments, the Canadian government, and the Canadian people, detest Communism in Asia or any place else.

"We will do what we can and should, to eliminate it from our own country and to protect ourselves from its aggressive and subversive designs from abroad. When it shows itself in other countries in the form of military aggression, as it did in Korea, we must oppose it. As a doctrine we should expose it as reactionary and as the instrument of Russian imperialism.

"But we should not forget that in Asia it has managed to attach itself to forces of nationalism and social reform... as a doctrine, Communism in Asia will not be destroyed by guns though guns have to be used when Communist violence and banditry occurs. It will be destroyed by Asians themselves when its true character is unmasked."
