

WAR NEWS.

Special Dispatch to Examiner.

LONDON, March 12. In the Commons this afternoon Sir Stafford Northcote said the Government had not heard that the Russians were entrenched on the peninsula of Gallipoli.

VIENNA, March 13. At the joint sitting of the Sub-Committees of the Hungarian delegation to-day, the credit asked for by Count Andrássy was unanimously adopted.

PARIS, March 13. A special to the *Leir* from Constantinople, states that the Sultan has summoned Prince Hessian of Egypt to Constantinople.

It is said that the Prince is implicated in the conspiracy of Suliman Pasha. Cheri Pasha is going to Constantinople to intercede for him.

BUCHAREST, March 13. The papers mention the rumor that Germany and Austria would consent to the retrocession of Bessarabia if the mouth of the Danube are left in possession of Roumania. The British fleet has arrived in the Gulf of Ismal from Toasla.

BERLIN, March 13. A despatch says that it is reported that Count Andrássy has informed the Hungarian budget committee that Russia would never consent to the extension of Bulgaria, or to Russian occupation of the Province for more than six months.

BERLIN, March 12. General Keatner, who was waiting to be tried by court martial for his defeat at Plevna, was released from arrest, and has been appointed assistant Commandant of War.

CONSTANTINOPLE, March 13. It is expected that Subdonsab Donlah Bey, late Ambassador at Berlin, will be the second Turkish Plenipotentiary to the Congress.

LONDON, March 12. In the House of Commons, to-night, a motion of Ashley, censuring Layard, British Ambassador at Constantinople, in connection with the affair of the negroport correspondence, was rejected by a vote of 266 to 432.

CONSTANTINOPLE, March 13. The Russians have occupied Kere Keri, half an hour's march from Bucjuckers, on the Bosphorus. They also occupied the majority of the villages around Constantinople, and continue advancing towards the City.

CONSTANTINOPLE, March 12. Prince Hessian has refused to obey the orders of the Porte to evacuate Verna, declaring that he awaits the Khedive's orders. There is some agitation in Syria in favor of annexation to Egypt.

BELGRADE, March 13. Seven thousand men of the Servian army of Deiahars disbanded.

ST. PETERSBURG, March 13. The *Journal de St. Petersburg* declares untenable the reported English demand that all points of the treaty should be submitted to the congress. If the mission of the congress is to result in peace, subjects of a European character, and which might lead to an excited but resultless discussion, must be set aside.

OUR OTTAWA DESPATCH.

(Special Despatch to Daily Examiner.)

OTTAWA, March 13. Before the close of the debate Mr. Pope said he would support no Government which imposed duties beyond the requirements of the revenue. He was not in favor of protection, but would advocate the fostering of industries by lowering duties and placing raw material on the free list. He could not support the policy of the Administration in additional duties being imposed last year which reduced the price of barley to farmers, whilst corn was allowed duty free from the United States and manufactured into bad liquors, which were distributed broadcast throughout the country, and had the effect of poisoning and demoralizing people. Two hundred thousand dollars and upwards were annually paid in P. E. Island in the construction of shipping, and at least five cents per bushel more obtained for oats, owing to shipbuilding, which industry would have been destroyed had the Government's policy been carried out. He voted for the amendment, as it was a means most likely to obtain Reciprocity. The House divided at 4 a. m. The vote was 77 to 114.

A CONFESSION OF FAILURE.—It is said at Cape Tormentine that the Dominion Government has arranged with Mr. Mutart for conveying the mails to and from P. E. Island by ice-boat between the Capes for the next two months. This is an official acknowledgment of the failure of that expensive "experiment" known as the *Northern Light*.—*Moncton Times*.

A DESPATCH of the 9th to the *St. John Globe* from Newcastle, N. B., says:—Yesterday afternoon Corner Bishop held an inquest on the body of an infant found in the cellar of Andrew Mitchell's residence, North Esk. Eliza Allison, a servant of Mitchell's, proved to be the mother. Dr. Dawson held a *post mortem*, and proved the infant to have breathed, as the lungs were inflated. The girl has been committed to the County jail to await trial at the Supreme Court. The infant was born on Friday, March 1. The body was not found until the Thursday following.

A DESPATCH from Montreal of the 12th says: Irrepressible conflict between the Orange and Green factions, that has brought so much disgrace on Montreal, was renewed again this evening in the eastern part of the city. A fight, which was commenced by youths belonging to the rival religions, soon developed into formidable proportions by large numbers of men taking part and, until the arrival of a large body of police, threatened to be very serious. Two men, named James Hurst and Peter Lucy, the former a Protestant, and the latter a Catholic, were stabbed, one in the breast and the other in the left side, but the wounds, although severe, are not supposed to be fatal. Three of the rioters have been arrested, including a man named Beatty, who is alleged to be the one who stabbed Lucy. Several shots from revolvers were fired during the melee, but there is no one reported injured thereby. Of late, party rows have been of frequent occurrence, and yesterday two Protestants were arrested and placed on their trial for an attempt to murder a Catholic named Cummins, by firing several shots at him, a few nights previously on the street. Nearly all the youths in the city carry revolvers, and apprehensions are entertained that serious trouble is brewing unless the most active measures are taken to prevent it.

No doubt many persons in this community made resolutions (for an improvement in themselves) on last New Year's day, and it may not be too much of a presumption to believe that a few at least have been broken and many good promises disregarded. Thursday, the first of Lent, a great many renewed their resolutions. Some toppers "swore off" for the forty days of Lent; others promised to do with ten instead of twenty drinks, and those formerly taking half the former number perhaps, made a resolution to do with one drink before or after each meal; and more again put aside—or said they would—"a little Scotch" or "a drop of Irish" or "a little water with brandy and sugar in it, and touch nothing but English or domestic ale. Of those who gamble—play draw poker, buff, seven up, Crib or 42—many no doubt will resolve not to play at all during Lent, while, perhaps, more will promise not to stay out at their favorite spots more than four nights in the week; and a good many devotees of 45's will solemnly declare that they will not hide the ace of hearts in their coat sleeves, turn up an ace from the bottom of the pack or range. Dancers will give up their favorite amusement for six weeks, and no doubt those who now flirt, or "Spoon," as some are said to call it, will make the promise to "put away the handkerchief" until the Holy season is over.—*St. John News*.

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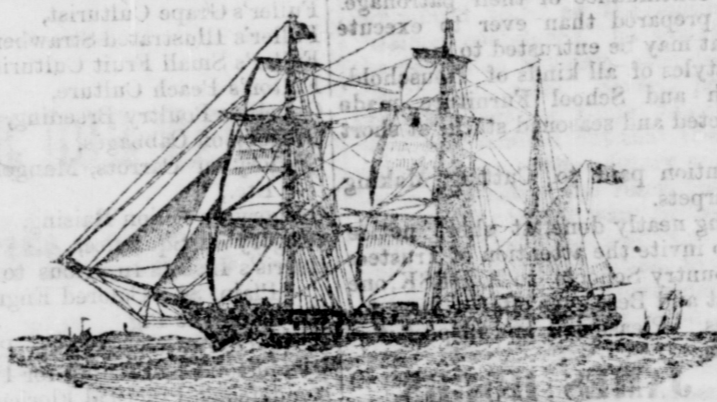
