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Tourist Revenue Estimated At More Than \$7,500,000

Conservative estimates indicated that Prince Edward Island's tourist revenue in 1959 was worth at least \$7,500,000. George V. Fraser, director of the provincial travel bureau said yesterday.

One of several speakers to address the annual meeting of the Prince Edward Island Tourist Association held in the Charlottetown Hotel yesterday afternoon, Mr. Fraser said that in his opinion this figure was low since it was based on a daily expenditure on the part of each tourist of only \$8.

"It is likely that the intake of this industry here was closer to \$10,000,000," he remarked.

Maritime Electric Offers To Buy S' Side Rural Lines

A proposal from the Maritime Electric Company setting out the general terms on which an agreement of sale may be based for the purchase of rural lines now owned by the Town of Summerside was read at the regular council meeting held last evening.

Mayor W. A. Currie presided with all councillors present, as well as Town Manager J. A. Brophy and Town Clerk John Cameron.

According to the proposal Maritime Electric is to purchase all the rural lines owned by the town with the exception of the Dekker branch of the St. Elmo's East line, Road's Corner and Sherbrooke Road.

Negotiations between the town and Maritime Electric have been underway for several months. The town has been concerned with the operation of these rural lines for some time as it has been found that remote rural lines

have not been operated at a profit consistent with the return set up by the public utilities board.

The purchase price set forward in the proposal by Maritime Electric was \$187,542 for the rural lines in question.

Copies of the proposal are being forwarded to each councillor today for consideration.

WANT VETERINARIAN

A resolution requesting the provincial government to place a duly qualified veterinarian in the Summerside abattoir for the purpose of performing the inspections passed at the meeting. It was moved by Councillor Fred L. Arsenault and seconded by Councillor Robert B. Dewar.

The resolution stated that while the town operated a municipally owned abattoir and the Public Health Act of the province require a pre-inspection of all animals slaughtered at an abattoir within a town, district or municipality there was no active veterinarian resident in the town to carry out such inspections.

Police reports for the months of September and October were read to the council members by the chairman of the police committee, Fred Arsenault.

In the reports, Chief Peter H. White noted that during the month of September, the most serious crime committed was the holding up of the cashier at the telephone office and that the accused was apprehended and sentenced to two years in Dorchester Penitentiary.

JUVENILE PROBLEMS

Although no very serious crime has taken place during the month of October, the police chief stated that there has been considerable trouble regarding juveniles breaking street lights, damaging "stop signs" and attempting breaks at residences by breaking the class or cutting the screening in the doors and attempting to gain entrance.

He said that in some instances entry was made and small articles or small amounts of money taken. He also requested the help of the citizens in informing the police of any such suspicious action on the part of juveniles.

In regard to traffic problem, the chief noted that during the month he has made slight changes in regard to traffic coming on to Water Street from the south end and made it a right turn only.

This change he said has helped traffic considerably at the corner of Water and Spring streets and that other changes will be made from time to time.

Agric. Staff Is Enlarged

A new operator of cattle extension work, particularly in the field of cow testing, will be added to the provincial department of agriculture staff within the next few weeks, Premier Walter R. Shaw announced yesterday.

The new employee is Charles Carr who has had much recent experience in artificial insemination work in the New Glasgow, N.S., area. The Premier remarked "we are extremely fortunate in securing his services".

Mr. Shaw, minister of agriculture, said his department will inaugurate an all-out program to bring more concentrated attention to the breeders of livestock here and said he feels that as plans materialize the livestock producers will realize the department is doing everything possible to assist them in solving their many problems.

New Housing Rumor Denied
