

OBITUARY.

John Kiely, Esq., aged 63 years, 8 months and 20 days, who had been ailing for some time, passed peacefully away at his home in White Sands, on Monday morning the 6th inst. He was a son of the late James Kiely, and was honorable and straightforward to a degree. He was a man of quiet, unselfish and generous disposition and of a kindly refined and gentlemanly manner. He loved his home and fireside, and delighted to chat with and impart knowledge to his family. He possessed a very remarkable taste for reading and would frequently sit up till after midnight reading papers, etc; consequently his mind was a storehouse for knowledge, and he could converse fluently and intelligently on any subject. He also possessed a very retentive memory and could relate incidents of his boyhood days as clearly as a last week's occurrence. As a cheerful conversationalist and entertainer he will be greatly missed, and many can recall with pleasure the pleasant evenings spent around his fireside. While he had hosts of friends wherever he was known it is not known that he had an enemy, and by his death this place loses one of its most upright residents. He goes to his long rest honored and regretted by the community. He was for several years clerk of the small debt court at Murray Harbor South, and was then appointed a Justice of the Peace which office he held till the time of his death, and his career as such was an honorable one. Every case placed in his hands was given the most searching and careful consideration; the minutest detail of each being diligently considered before giving his decision thereon. As a magistrate he was unequalled here, and will be greatly missed as such. He was also appointed a commissioner for taking affidavits in the Supreme Court of Kings County, also a commissioner for taking proof and acknowledgement of wills and deeds for Kings County all of which he fully filled. He was, in short, a good resident and neighbour, a kind husband, and a loving father, and was highly respected wherever known. He leaves a widow and two sisters, Mrs. Wm. Praught, Charlottetown, and Miss Mary Isabella Kiely, Boston, Mass, and the following daughters and son to mourn their loss, Mrs. Wm. Thorson and Miss Maggie D. Kiely, Fitchburg, Mass, Mrs. Henry Dunn and Mrs. D. Jamieson, Sturgeon, Mrs. W. H. Bell, Murray Harbor and John Roach Kiely, White Sands. He was laid to rest amid tears in the Roman Catholic Cemetery at Sturgeon. To his widow and family we extend our sympathy in their sad bereavement.

C., and a large circle of friends and relatives to mourn her early demise.
