

Shediac Man Charged Here in Excise Case

The case of Alphonse Joseph LeBlanc, Shediac, N.B., was adjourned to Oct. 18 for summation in Charlottetown, with the Crown to be completed, yesterday morning. LeBlanc is charged under the Excise Act with having possession of 30 gallons of illegally manufactured spirits. It appears in city police court before Magistrate James Heald.

Three Crown witnesses were heard. The defence will produce no witnesses. The case for the Crown is being conducted by Staff Sgt. R.O. Lively, RCMP. Defence counsel is John P. Nicholson.

The first Crown witness was Cpl. William L. Davis, RCMP Charlottetown, who told the court that about 12:30 a.m. Sept. 18 he was parked behind the Co-op super market on Richmond Street, when he observed the arrival of an automobile that stopped in front of the Unemployment Insurance offices on Richmond Street.

He said he saw a man walk away from the area where the car was parked. After observing the actions of this man for a few minutes, Cpl. Davis said he approached the man, identified himself and asked to search the car. The man, identified as the accused, at first refused to allow the search but after being informed that Cpl. Davis had written authority to search, turned over the keys to the automobile. The car, a 1962 Buick, was owned by the accused.

FOUND SPIRITS
Cpl. Davis said seven cardboard cases, each containing four one-gallon cans of spirits and two loose one-gallon cans of spirits, were discovered in the car. The cans were sealed and found to be 100 per cent of proof. The police officer stated that he and three other officers were waiting in the area of the Unemployment Insurance offices for the accused because of information compiled and received in an extensive investigation carried out for three weeks.

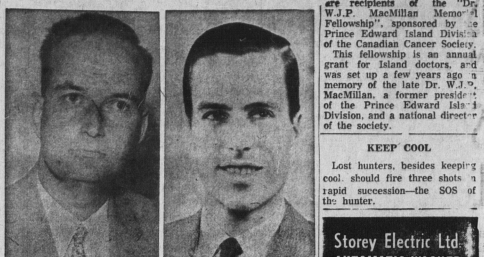

The remainder of the evening was spent in discussion of regular business. Chairman for the season was president Gerry Driscoll.

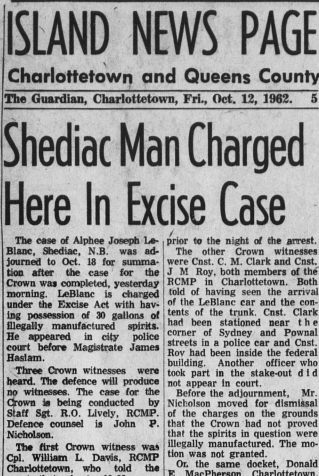
Column Day Observance Slated Today

Petit Jury Finds Accused Guilty

Ernest Milton Doucette, Oyster Bed Bridge, was found guilty of rape with a strong recommendation for mercy by a 12-man petit jury after two hours deliberation at the final sitting of the Supreme Court fall session yesterday.

Mr. Justice Mark R. MacGuigan presided, with Attorney-General Melvin McQuaid and Deputy Attorney-General Arthur McQuigan conducting the prosecution and John Holmes counsel for the defence.

During yesterday's session the court heard four witnesses for the Crown: Frank Murphy, proprietor of Murphy's service station; Vernon Morrison, with Doucette at the time of the alleged offence; Dr. J.A. Maloney, attending physician, and Mrs. Mabel Dolton, mother of the complainant.

Bernice Dolton gave evidence at Wednesday's sitting of the court. The offence is said to have occurred April 21.

Walter Morrissey, Charlottetown, was foreman of the jury.
